ELECTRICITY SAFE WAY OF LIGHTING TRAINS

Canadian Railways Asked To Adopt System Generally Used on European Roads.

The Canadian representative of the English firm of J. Stone & Company are interesting the Canadian railways in the advisability of lighting railway passenger coaches by electricity The Hawes Junction accident on the Midland railway in England, in December last, when the passenger coaches of a train took fire immedlately after a collision, was the occason of an investigation at the time by the board of trade. The fact was lestablished that the escape of illuminating gas, carried in reservoirs under the passenger coaches, was the cause of the most serious feature of the acbefore the board of trade suggested that electricty be used for lighting passenger coaches. Continental railiways have generally become interested in this method of lighting, and Stone and Company, who are the inventors of the system, will fit up a number of coaches to be run in Canada to demonstrate the success of their equipment.
Messrs. Stone and Company have

this to say of their lighting system:
The introduction of metallic filament amps has proved an adequate answer to incandescent gas lighting, inasmuch as the illumination is greatly increased thereby, and, in addition, while still preventing the possibility of such de-plorable results in the event of any derailment or collision unfortunately occurring, enables a considerable reduction to be made in capital cost of the electrical installations, owing to the fact that the size and weight of the installations fitted to the railway carriages is greatly reduced, and this further immensely reduces the annual cost of maintenance, which is a considerable advantage to the railway companies, and at the same time the traveling public benefit by the better




