After Clubbing Guards at the Kingston Penitentiary, They Escaped From Walls, But Were Recaptured—Desperadoes Tried to Secure Firearms, But Failed.

KINGSTON, April 29 .- (Special.) -Four desperate prisoners, brought down from Stony Mountain penitentiary early in March, in company with another convict, Vincent McNeil, sentenced at Woodstock to five years for burglary, pulled off one of the most sensational escapes to-day at noon ever made from Kingston penitentiary, but all five were recaptured within an hour and a half after they got out.

The Stony Mountain men are Arthur Bonner, Frank Jones, Harry Kelly and George Brown.

The men were kept in an isolation ward, as incorrigible, and the escape was made after McNeil had been let out of his cell to sweep the floor. While at his work he suddenly attacked Guard Ross Davis, secured the guard's billy and beat him on the head severely.

Davis dropped to the floor and McGill searched his pockets, took out Four desperate prisoners, brought down

Davis dropped to the floor and Mc-Gill searched his pockets, took out keys, unlocked the cells and let four prisoners out. Keeper Madden, who heard the row, hurried to the scene, but as he came up the five men attacked him. They stripped Madden of his clothes and pushed him into the cell, locked the door and then started out of the building.

out of the building.

Locked Up Physician.

At the door they met Dr. Daniel Phelan, penitentiary physician, pounced on him, and in a short time had him refleved of his uniform. The doctor was pushed into a cell and locked in, then the desperadoes unicoked the main door and escaped to the prison yard. Con-vict Jones was garbed in a surgeon's uniform and Convict Bonner in that of Keeper Madden. They boldly walked across the yard to the main en-

Guard Rutherford could see thru the peep-hole and he thought it was one of the guards with the prisoners, about to go out to work on the penitentiary farm. He promptly opened the gate, and, as he did so, he was struck on the head with a billy and felled to the ground. Then the five men had an easy time

Then the five men had an easy time getting out. They can over to the premises of Warden Platt, opposite the penitentiary. Here Farm Instructor McCarthy tried to intercept the gang, and he got a billy over the head for his trouble. Then the men rushed to the rear of the warden's house and took possession of a farmer's rig and drove a short distance, when they jumped out and ran for a hiding-place. The prison bells had been sounded and they knew the guards would be scattered all over with guns. Guards Opened Fire

Brown ran into the prison quarry, and Guard Beaupre nabled him; Kelly headed towards Portsmouth, and was caught hidding in a barn; Bonner, McNeil and Jones were lost track of for a short time, but later Bonner and McNeil were discovered on the front road about a mile from the penitentiary. The guards called to them to stop, but they? refused. Then, the guards, who were armed, opened fire.

Nearing the Cataraquie Creek the convicts jumped in the water and tried to dodge the builets by ducking their heads under the water. The key water, however, soon brought them to their senses, and they were glad enough to give up. Jones, last to be gathered in, was found in a barn. He was discovered by a little girl, and she notified the guards, who took him in charge He told the girl he was a guard and was looking for the escaped prisoners.
