Paris, April 21.—The Walloons of Prussia have sent a despatch to M. Clemenceau, chairman of the peace conference, requesting that their annexation to Prussia be canceled. The message to M. Clemenceau follows: "The Walloons of Prussia, feeling great anxiety on account of the news lately published in the press, earnestly request you to decide for the pure and simple disannexation of all the Walloon districts in Prussia. The inhabitants of cantons not Walloon, but indispensable to Belgium, might be consulted by means of a referendum, as will be the case with the population of the Sarre Basin."

REDS HAVE NOT OCCUPIED

Paris, April 21.—The naval port of Sebastopol, in the Crimea, has not been occupied by Russian soviet troops, according to a despatch to The Journal des Debats, dated Sunday at Salonica.

The despatch says that fighting appears to have stopped for the time being in the southern Crimea. The Bolsheviki are said to be slackening their advance in the face of the allied artillery fire.

The men aboard the Aroostook have been carefully selected. Virtually all of them have been drawn from the personnel of American naval air stations in France.
