Colonel Smith said it was only fair to state that there are a large num to state that there are a large number of military dependents to come, and that it would take several months to bring them back. They will come more slowly because of the disestablishment of the troops in England. They cannot be brought on troopships, and all the members of the permanent establishment must be cored manent establishment must be covered for without the aid of the military, as we have it today. There are 20,000 women and children to be brought home to Canada. To see about this is part of Colonel Obed Smith's mission to this country at the coun

sion to this country, at the present EIGHT-HOUR DAY With regard to the settlement of ex-soldiers on the land, he hopes to be able to co-ordinate the work on connection with Canadian, but im-

perial men.
The British government is now arranging for free transportation to a port of landing in Canada for imperial ex-service men and their families, women, war workers, widows, and children of ex-service men, but in no case is assistance to be given till each family and individual is approved by the immigration department in England. The third thing Colonel Smith is here for is to discuss with members of the department officials is a general emigration propaganda in the British Isles. This propaganda has not hitherto been possible because transport has been, and still is, lacking. Colonel Smith expects to visit all the settlement boards from Quebec to the Pacific.


CANADIAN DAY AT METHODIST CENTENARY
