

ALL GERMAN SHIPS TO LEAVE BALTIC

Owing to Attack on Riga Free Passage Permits Are Withdrawn.

Stettin, Germany, Oct. 12.—Demands that German ships on the Baltic be recalled to their home ports and that all others be forbidden to leave, were received by the government in a telegram from London this morning, according to the Abend Post of this city. The telegram is quoted as follows:

"Owing to the attack on Riga, free passage permits are provisionally withdrawn for all German ships in the Baltic. All ships in the Baltic must be recalled and no other ships must be permitted to put out to sea as long as this prohibition remains in force. Ships encountered in the Baltic are subject to seizure by the allies."

The newspaper says this telegram has been transmitted to the "subcommittee" at German Baltic ports. In concerned article, the Abend Post asserts the entente powers have re-established a "small blockade" of Germany.

ALBERT ATTENDS SERVICE AT ANCIENT MISSION

Santa Barbara, Cal., Oct. 12.—Albert of the Belgians, with his consort and the Duke of Brabant, attended mass today in the historic Spanish mission of Santa Barbara. The scene within the ancient church was in striking contrast to the pomp of the service in Boston's cathedral last Sunday; but was not less colorful.

Franciscan friars, in their dark brown habits, waited upon the guests steps to receive their majesties and, formed in line, led the procession, while four of them held a canopy over the royal Belgians as they filed slowly down the aisle.

The Belgians were welcomed by Father Julius, the superior of the order, which has conducted the mission since it was founded in 1786 by Fernine Lasue.

SIMCOE CHURCH BURNS

Losses of Nearly \$50,000 Wharf Fire Destroys the Fine St. James' Methodist Edifice.

Simcoe, Ont., Oct. 12.—A fire of mysterious origin broke out about 8 o'clock Saturday evening in St. James' Methodist Church here, and in a short time had destroyed the whole interior of the church property, and some charred portions of the roof being left. The fire walls and ever, prevented the fire brigade, however, from extinguishing the flames to which is the finest and best equipped in the district. The cause is absolutely a mystery.

Only four weeks ago a beautiful memorial window to the members who fell in the great war was unveiled. The church property, valued at nearly \$75,000, was only partially insured. Services are being held today in the school room. The previous church was destroyed by fire in 1886.

FIVE HUNDRED BUY PLANES IN NINETY DAYS

Detroit, Oct. 12.—In the last three months more than 500 persons in the United States have either purchased or ordered airplanes and were the president of the Aerial League of America, says that it is unfortunate for the aeronautic movement that the makers cannot fill their orders. He gives it as his belief that more than 2,000 machines for pleasure could be sold immediately.

Had to Carry Baggage At Both Ends of Trip

New York, Oct. 12.—Because of the railroad strike they left in England and the harbor strike they met in New York, passengers arriving tonight on the Saxonia from London and Halifax, were forced to carry their own baggage at both ends. Many of the arrivals related stories of being transported down the Thames in "penny boats" to the vessel which received them in mid-channel.
