WAITED ON MINISTER FISHER

Cattle Dealers Urge That Steps Be Taken to Prevent Spread of Foot and Mouth Disease.

PROTECTION TO INDUSTRY PROMISED

of Retaliation Against Canadian Cattle.

Hon. Sydney Fisher, (Minister of Agriculture, was waited upon yesterday afternoon at the Rossin by a deputation representing the Dominion Live Stock Dealers' Association of Ontario, with the view to asking the government to take the necessary precautions to prevent, if possible, the introduction or spread of the foot and mouth disease in Canada. On the deputation were: Ald. Dunn, president of the association; S. Halligan, of the firm of Nellis & Halligan; H. A. Mullins, M. P. for Russell, Man.; Thomas Crawfird, (M.L.A.; T. O. Robinson and) fird, (M.L.A.; T. O. Robinson and Thomas Williamson. The deputation was introduced by W. F. Maciean, M.P. Ald. Dunn explained the object of the conference, and in doing so stated that they, as an association, endorsed the action of the government, in so far as they had gone to prevent the introduction of the foot and mouth disease into Canada in prohibiting the transportation of cattle from that portion of the United States which is declared infected.

The Minister assured the deputation that every precaution that was deemed necessary so far had been taken, and that in the future nothing would be left undone to prevent the introduction into Canada of anything that would affect our live stock interests. The Minister added that he was very pleased to have met the deputation and to discuss the subject with them in a friendly spirit. On his attention having been directed to the reports circulated, that Canadian cattle were debarred from entering the State of Illinois, by way of retaliation, the Minister admitted having read the report, but remarked that having had no official information on the matter he could not credit such action on the part of the American authorities; but if such were the case the matter would be looked into fully by the Canadian government.

Hon. Mr. Fisher left the city in the evening for Ottawa, thoroly delighted with the success of the Winter Fair at Grelph, which he had been attending.

Thursday night was a red letter evening in Arcanum circles. A large gathering of all the Arcanum Councils in Toronto was held for the purpose of a class initiation. This comparison brings home the practical advantage of the "made in Canada" theory.


