

DANISH COUNT'S AIRSHIP IS "IT"

Taken Over by the Government
—Sailed at 38-Mile Gait
Four Hours.

Fredrichshaven, Sept. 30.—Dr. Felix Lewald, of the department of finance, acting for the Imperial Government, has taken over Count Zeppelin's balloon shed on Lake Constance. This means that the Government regards the count's experiment in aerial navigation as successful, and that he has won the financial assistance promised him conditionally.

The count's success in the last few days, when his airship maneuvered over Lake Constance, remaining in the air for over four hours and traveling at the rate of 38 miles per hour, has attracted the attention of aeronauts in foreign countries as well as in Germany.

SOCIALISTS DEFEATED

They Failed To Capture Kirkdale Division of Liverpool.

London, Sept. 30.—The determined attempt made yesterday by the Labor Socialist candidate to capture the seat in the House of Commons for the Kirkdale division of Liverpool, made vacant by the death of David MacIvor (Unionist), resulted in failure. The outcome of the by-election was that Charles MacArthur (Unionist), secured the seat with a slightly increased majority.

OIL-PIPE LINE PROFITS

Cleared \$4,091,022 on Investment of \$2,228,758.

New York, Sept. 30.—The Indiana Pipe Line Company, a subsidiary of the Standard Oil Company, made a profit of \$4,091,022 in 1936 on a total investment of \$2,228,758, according to the company's figures, produced by George Chesbro, controller of the National Pipe Line Company, who appeared as a witness in the federal suit against the oil combine. Mr. Chesbro testified that the Indiana Pipe Line Company was a common carrier, engaged only in the transportation of oil. He said it transported practically only the oil of the Standard Company.

The counsel for the Government allege that it will be shown that the profits made by the Pipe Line Company have been in some cases twenty times the actual cost of operation.

SPOOK STOPS WEDDING

Widow Prevented from Marrying by "Spirit" of late Husband.

Chicago, Sept. 24.—William F. Havens, dead husband had come to her in the spirit and warned her against marrying again. Mrs. Mary Lincoln, widow of Charles Lincoln, refused to proceed with her intended marriage to Joseph Parker, a prominent young man, and the guests who were assembled to witness the ceremony were dismissed.

Mrs. Lincoln is a pretty young woman. A little over a year ago her husband died. After brief mourning she was courted by Parker, whom she finally agreed to marry. Parker furnished a house and invitations were issued for the ceremony.

In the afternoon, when Parker called at the home of his fiancée, he found her in tears and greatly excited. She finally declared that the ceremony could not proceed, but refused to give a reason.

At last he got an explanation from her mother. She said that some time the previous night her daughter had come sobbing into her room and declared that she had just been visited by the spirit of her dead husband. He had warned her against marrying again, she said, and when she protested the spirit had taken hold of her arms and held her until she promised that she would call the marriage off. LOCKED GUARD IN CELL

Prisoners Escape From Chicago Jail in View of Crowd.

Chicago, Sept. 30.—After having locked a jail guard and a "trustee" in a cell, two prisoners climbed through a window on the fourth floor of the county jail and escaped. Many persons who stood in Illinois street, watching the prisoners saw two iron bars, thought they were workmen. A third prisoner crawled through the window, but the onlookers, realizing at last what was going on, shouted an alarm.

While the prisoners on the fourth tier of cells were in the exercise room one of them asked the guard, Michael Bloomberg, to unlock his cell for a moment. John Scott, a "trustee," just then handed Bloomberg a key. While reading this at the open cell door both Scott and the guard were forced into the cell and locked in by prisoners.

Using saws that had been smuggled to them, the prisoners sawed the bars from a window, while their fellows sang and shouted to prevent the guard from giving the alarm. The guard also was warned by the "trustee" to make no outcry on penalty of death, and he remained in the cell hours before he was released.

Frank Constantine, who was sentenced to life imprisonment for the murder of Mrs. Gentry, had just been removed from the fourth tier of cells and it is thought that the escape was originally planned in his behalf.

FAITHFUL FOR 25 YEARS

Death of Dependent Relatives Leaves Woman Free to Marry Lover.

Chicago, Sept. 30.—Released from a vow by the death of her invalid mother, uncle and aunt, Miss Viola Woodin has just closed a betrothal of 25 years by marrying Clayton B. Baldwin in Rochester, N. Y. The bridegroom is a brother of Mrs. Wilbur G. Hamlin, of Chicago.

As boy and girl they played together in a village in Western New York. Miss Woodin's father fell from a scaffold 25 years ago and was killed. She was a popular young woman then, but she turned her back on her admirers and resolved to devote her life to caring for her invalid mother, uncle and aunt.

About this time Mr. Baldwin, who was a young man then, offered his hand. Miss Woodin confessed she loved him, but declared she placed duty above her love.

"If you care enough for me to wait until I am free," she said, "I will marry you."

Mr. Baldwin said he would wait. He went to Nebraska and bought a tract of land. Today he is a wealthy farmer living near Morrill.

DISHONEST BOY SHARP SPECULATOR

Steals \$5,000 and Invests It Profitably in a North Dakota Farm.

Pittsburg, Sept. 30.—Declaring that her 18-year-old messenger who ran away to Dakota with \$5,000 belonging to the independent Packing Company, to make a home from his 17-year-old sweetheart, will not be prosecuted so long as he remains honest.

The packing company's management believed the boy honest despite his act, and indirectly acknowledged in Judge Barnes' court that he was tempted beyond a reasonable limit. Also for the boy it is asserted that he had an excellent business head, and Patrick Brennan, of the packers, told the court he would give the youth his old job or find him other employment.

Officially the charge of larceny against Havens was stricken from the court docket on motion of Assistant State Attorney Short, with the proviso that it might be reinstated if the boy departed from the narrow path.

Along the first part of last May Havens obtained his job with the packing corporation, and within a week thereafter was sent with \$5,000 in checks and cash to deposit in the bank. The boy disappeared with the cash. At his home, 7013 Prairie avenue, his parents said that he had often talked of buying a farm, where he and his sweetheart would go to raise chickens and garden truck.

In a little while the sweetheart, Lillian Ahern, the 17-year-old daughter of James Ahern, manager of the Carpenter Stone Company, was traced by detectives from her home to a railway station, then on to Plesher, N. D. Young Havens was waiting at the station for Miss Ahern. He had bought a farm, some horses, cattle, blooded chickens and even the lumber for his house, then sent for the girl.

The detective arrested both and brought them back to Chicago. The girl was sent to a convent, and Havens was lodged in jail. His attorney, Miles J. Devine, advised the parents against getting bail because he wanted him placed in a reformatory.

Before Havens was taken from Dakota he assisted representatives of the packers to sell all he had purchased. He had bought cheap, and his cleverness in forcing a bargain in the sale of the goods impressed the representatives of the company.

"The money was so well invested that the company secured the return of practically everything lost," asserted Attorney Devine. "Where is my client? I suppose he has started out to find the girl."

PLAGUE OF SNAILS

Pittsburg People Are Overrun by the Crawling Creatures.

New York, Sept. 30.—The Herald has received the following dispatch from Pittsburg: The Thirtieth Ward of this city is overrun at the present time with snails four inches long, which have become such an annoyance that the residents have appealed to Dr. J. F. Edwards, superintendent of the Bureau of Health, and he is now trying to figure out how to get rid of them. The snails are known as the hog-faced variety, and are natives of China. Just how they got to Pittsburg in such large numbers is something that Dr. Edwards cannot figure out.

The snails made their appearance at night by the hundreds, and people are awakened by the creatures crawling over them in bed. Several men who have indulged too freely in liquor have been thrown into convulsions on account of them. The Bureau of Health will try to drive them out.

Bleeding and Helpless in Ice-Box—Mongrel Gave Alarm.

New York, Sept. 30.—The intelligence of a mongrel dog and the ready aid of a policeman saved Antonio Petrucci of East One Hundred and Forty-Eight street, a young butcher, from bleeding to death while he was a prisoner in his employer's ice-box at 584 Morris avenue, the Bronx.

The young man went into the ice box with a big sharp knife, and in trying to keep the door from closing slipped and fell on the knife. The sharp blade cut an artery in his right thigh. He gave one loud groan and became unconscious as the door slammed, imprisoning him.

There was no one in Nicola Rouco's shop at the time. But Dick, the dog, whom the butcher's assistant had been feeding, realized that his friend was in trouble. Dick ran up the avenue barking, and at the corner circled around Policeman Wickman and Detective John O'Brien until he got the officer's attention.

Dick then led the way to the shop, barking and looking back constantly. The dog rushed up to the door of the ice-box and howled. When Wickman and the door Petrucci was near death.

The bride was attended by her sister, Miss Margaret Proctor, as maid of honor, and Miss D. I. Mackenzie, as bridesmaid, while the groom was supported by his brother, Mr. F. S. Watt, of Windsor.

NEWFOUNDLAND'S TROUBLE

Premier Bond Declares the Improved Rescript is Invalid.

St. Johns, Nfld., Sept. 30.—In a lengthy interview with a staff correspondent of the London Times, Premier Bond states that he believes that the imperial rescript proclaimed on Tuesday is invalid, "because it attempts to suspend by the exercise of royal prerogative legislation which has received royal assent."

The act of 1899, under which the rescript was made, the premier said, "was passed to confer upon the crown the powers necessary to carry into execution the treaty of 1818 and it endowed the crown with authority to make by order in council such regulations as requested to give effect to the purposes of the treaty."

"Consequently orders in council, made thereunder, have the force of acts of the Imperial Parliament and thus override any colonial legislation inconsistent with such order."

"The British Government have never admitted that the treaty of 1818 gives American vessels the right to employ colonial fishermen in contravention to colonial laws or renders American vessels immune from being boarded from apprehension of offenders against the colonial laws."

"Therefore any concession in that direction made by the modus vivendi are really new rights granted by what is virtually a new temporary treaty between the British and American Governments and is outside the scope of the treaty of 1818."
