OIL-PIPE LINE PROFITS

Cleared \$4,091,022 on an investment of \$2,228,758.

New York, Sept. 30.-The Indiana Pipe Line Company, a subsidiary of the Standard Oil Company, made profit of \$4,091,022 in 1903 on a total investment of \$2,228,758. according to the company's figures, produced George Chesbro, controller of the National Pipe Line Company, who apsuit against the oil combine. Mr. Chesbro testified that the Indiana Pipe Line Company was a common carrier, and engaged only in the transportation of oil. He said it transported practically only the oil of the Standard Company.
