CZAR SHOWING AN IRON HAND

An Era of Repression Follows Dismissal of Duma—Turmoil in Interior.

St. Petersburg, July 23.—The news from the interior shows that the fermentation in the cities has already begun. There is a renewal of the strikes in Poland and in the south, but no rioting on a big scale is reported, with the exception of at Kharkoff.

From every direction come reports that an era of repression has been inaugurated, including the confiscation of radical newspapers and wholesale arrests of political and revolutionary suspects.

Upon all the dead walls of this city are posted proclamations of the prefect of police prohibiting meetings, public or private, without permission; the distribution of proclamations, the raising of flags and singing in the streets.

The prefect of police placed police officers in the newspaper offices last night to see that they did not transgress the limits of the law, under threat of confiscation of their issues. This accounts for the comparative mildness of the press comments today. Nevertheless the edition of the Rech was seized soon after it left the press.

The most important developments of today took place in the Finnish parliament, which the members of Parliament had fled to continue the sessions formally dissolved at St. Petersburg. The members had been frantically at work on their manifesto to the people, anticipating the possible arrival of troops, when the assembly was informed that the Governor-General of Finland had ordered the governors of Viborg to close the meeting, using military force, if necessary. The Governor-General added that such meetings could not be held in Finland. At the last moment the Constitutional Democrats joined the Radicals, and the Duma adopted a hastily prepared proclamation protesting against the dissolution of Parliament. The assembly then adjourned.

Immediately after the governor's announcement that the meeting must be stopped a detachment of infantry passed from the Hotel Belvidere singing, to show that there are enough troops to carry out the threat of dispersal.

The members of Parliament intend to return to St. Petersburg in a body tomorrow morning. It is thought arrangements will be made to have them met at the station by their supporters, who will make a demonstration and declare a general strike, but secrecy on this point is strictly maintained.

There was a very excited session of the house today, and a general scramble to realize, but while prices continued to fall until the very end, everything closing at the lowest quotations of the day, there was no actual panic. All issues suffered, industrials and bank shares falling as much as 25 to 30 points. Imperial four closed 7-8 down at 69, the lowest point in their history. Fives closed at 82, against 83-74 on Saturday.

NEW MAN TO HEAD THE FRENCH ARMY

Choice of General Hagron to Succeed Brugere Is Universally Approved.

Paris, July 23.—Since the days of Gen. Boulanger, when France was on the verge of falling under a military dictatorship, there has been a strong current of popular opinion against the nomination of a general to the portfolio of minister of war. The radical party, which in all probability will preside over the destinies of the republic for many a year to come, appears already to have accepted it as a tradition that the war minister shall be a civilian. Both M. Etienne and his predecessor, Berteaux, were entirely lacking in anything except administrative capacity, as far as the army is concerned. The chief of the state, too, is anything but a soldier—witness the unbroken line of recent civilian presidents, Carnot, Casimir Perier, Faure, Loubet, and M. Fallieres—though the president of the republic is nominally the head of the army as well.

It is clear, then, that the real business of preparing the army as a fighting machine and of controlling the generals in the field must be vested in a specially selected body of generals of ripe experience and tried capacity. This body is the conseil superieur de la guerre, its vice-president holding the rank of generalissimo. It is, therefore, of vital importance to the republic that this general be the "best among the best."

Gen. Brugere, the present holder of the post, is on the point of retiring, having attained the age limit of the general responsibility of selecting his successor devolves, therefore, upon M. Etienne, and is of vital importance to the republic. Etienne has already made his choice—a choice, he remarked, which is universally approved. The new generalissimo, Gen. Hagron, who thus becomes vice-president of the supreme council of war in time of peace and commander designate of the armies of the northeast in time of war.

Gen. Hagron was a prominent figure in the life of the republic. As colonel of the One Hundred and Nineteenth Regiment of Infantry, to the command of which he was appointed in 1893, he developed those eminent qualities as a soldier which ever since have marked him as the coming man. Since that period he has been in command of the Sixth Army Corps—the iron division which guards the frontier—and has thus an intimate knowledge of the point of concentration of the French armies in case of mobilization. As a member of the conseil superieur de la guerre and destined to the command of an army, Gen. Hagron studied deeply the grave problem of revictualing. He has also initiated the excellent practice of bringing together his own staff and the staffs of the various army corps which would compose his command, so that they may learn to work together and be trained according to his ideas.

He is a strong believer in the value of active work in the field as the best preparation of an officer for actual warfare. Too many French staff officers, otherwise admirably equipped by the école de guerre, are at the present time sacrificed to exigencies of office work and red tape. Military men are convinced that Gen. Hagron will put an end to this state of things and that he will reform the staff in this respect.

FIGURES IN HER EYE

French Girl Has Three and Comma Distinctly Marked.

Paris, July 23.—The Petit Parisien publishes soberly the details of a remarkable story of a child, one of whose eyes is distinctly marked with three numerals and a punctuation point. The strange tale comes from Pointe du Finistère, where is the half-forgotten islet of Tudy, which is named in honor of the saint who is venerated throughout Bretagne.

On the island live the family of a fisherman of the name of Le Guen, consisting of the rugged father and mother and a daughter Marie, 4 years old.

Graven on the corner of the girl's left eye below the pupil in a horizontal line are the figures 22, 4. They are clearly visible as is also the well-formed comma.

Dr. Guevel of Pont l'Abbe, who examined her to determine the cause of the abnormality, declined to give a formal opinion, but suggested three explanations: That it was hereditary through never-diseased ancestors, that it is the stigmata of a vegetable growth, or that it is due to medical tattooing with nitrate of silver, necessitated by an affection of the eye in early infancy. The parents declare that the girl never underwent an operation.

The Petit Parisien records as a coincidence which it declares is worth noting, that a fishing boat at the neighboring port of Douarnenez carries the number 22, 4.

CHICAGO MAN WORSHIPS SUN

Offers His Boy as a Sacrifice to Old Sol.

MAKES HIS ROOF AN ALTAR

Binds Son With Heavy Chains and Weights—Gathers Family About in Weird Ceremony.

Chicago, July 23.—Peculiar beliefs of sun worshippers tenets were described by witnesses in the stock yards police court Saturday. James Boesrup, a giant barber residing at 1315 West Forty-seventh street, is the alleged sun worshiper.

The following acts were attributed to him by witnesses:

Offering his son as a sacrifice to the sun, by loading him with chains and weights and exposing him to the torrid rays.

Mounting a soap box in the sunshine of his back yard and assembling his family about him for weird worship.

Holding as sacred objects the chains and weights with which he bound his boy.

Making the roof of a shed an altar on which to offer sacrifices to the sun.

James Boesrup, Jun., the 10-year-old son of the barber, was exposed to the blazing sun for five hours on the roof of the shed, it is alleged, and it was on that account that the father was arrested and brought before Justice Fitzgerald at the stock yards court. A change of venue was taken to Justice Jandus.

Mrs. Mamie Ryan, living at 1315 West Forty-seventh street, next door, was the chief witness against the father.

"Last Tuesday," she said, before the case was called, "the boy came home. The father upbraided him for misdeeds, shook him until his teeth rattled in his head and dragged him in the yard."

"I'll put you where the sun god will punish you," he said to the boy. In the back yard are three or four sheds. A big fence surrounds the yard. The father dragged the boy to the roof of one of the sheds. He looked a long chain about the boy's ankles.

"He weighted the chain with a dozen flatirons. There he left the boy exposed to the pitiless rays of the sun for five long hours. The boy cried in agony. He was hungry, but got not a bite to eat. On other occasions the father had punished him in the same way."

"He is a very bad boy," said the father in his defense. "I had to punish him in some way. I did not leave him without anything to eat. His experience did not injure him seriously."

The boy, victim of his father's cruelty, told a strange story.

"My father," he said, "used to get us together in the back yard on Sunday mornings. He would get up on a soap box and mother and I would be told to kneel beside him. He would look up toward the sun and seem to be praying. I don't know all he said, but I would hear him talk about sunlight and fresh air for our souls."

When Sergt. Pegley went to arrest the barber, who is 50 years of age, and six feet tall, he met with no resistance. When, however, the officer asked for the chains and weights to use as evidence, the barber refused.

"You are not fit to touch that chain," the barber is alleged to have said. "I will not show you where it is. I will not let you touch it with your hands."

Justice Jandus, when the case was called by him on a change of venue from Justice Fitzgerald, continued the hearing until Tuesday morning. The delay was granted on request of Sergt. Pegley, who desired more time to secure witnesses.

KINGS DELIGHT IN SHOOTING

Emperor Francis Josef Goes Chamois Hunting.

THE KAISER A GREAT SHOOTER

Has Slain Nearly 34,000 Head of Game in the Last Twenty-Five Years.

Vienna, July 23.—Never was there a time when outdoor sports were in such favor with royalty as today. Although automobiling and yachting have a strong fascination for certain monarchs—King Edward, King Alfonso, King Victor and King Leopold, for instance—hunting remains, as in the past, the distinctive sport of crowned heads.

The keenest of royal sportsmen are Emperor Francis Josef of Austria-Hungary, Emperor William of Germany, King Carlos of Portugal and King Victor Emmanuel of Italy.

Emperor Francis Josef is devoted to chamois hunting, the dangers of which have always fascinated him from the days of his early youth. He usually indulges in this sport in the neighborhood of Ischi, the heart of the Austrian Tyrol. He is accompanied on his hunting expeditions by only one or two of the imperial family.

Intent on only hunting for the pleasure it affords him, Francis Josef's shooting parties are the simplest possible, divested of all show. Alpenstock in hand and gun over shoulder, the emperor leaves his shooting box at Gamsgrube, where he sleeps, at 4 a.m., and often spends the whole day in the mountains, returning late at night. He is a crack shot and rarely misses the chamois springing from rock to rock.

Emperor William is a fanatic on sport and an excellent shot, notwithstanding that he cannot use his left arm. His shoots, as a rule, with light guns, which he can easily hold in one hand. His favorite hunting grounds are in the royal forests of Konigs Wusterhausen, near Berlin, in the Grunewald and Springe. Generally he is accompanied on his expeditions by his aides-de-camp, the grand marshal of the court and by the grand master of the hunt. He always wears a short shooting jacket of gray material, this being one of the occasions on which he dons civilian attire.

According to official figures he has slain about 33,978 head of game in the last 25 years—2 buffaloes, 7 elk, 3 reindeer, 8 bears, 1,022 wild animals of various kinds, 3,139 deer, 680 roe deer, 121 chamois, 10,188 hares, 674 rabbits, 9,643 pheasants, 54 heath cock, 95 grouse, 20 foxes, 56 wild duck, 694 cormorants, 4 woodcock and 2,521 head of game not classified.

King Victor is an enthusiastic sportsman and is particularly fond of hunting in the valley of Aosta.

When chamois hunting in the valley of Jesso in 1897 with his father, Victor Emmanuel and the Duke of Abruzzi, a cousin, nearly lost their lives. They were overtaken by a snowstorm and almost frozen to death. In winter time whenever he finds the time and leisure he leaves Rome to shoot boar in the Abruzzi.

King Carlos' achievements as a sportsman are widely known. While visiting President Loubet at Ramouillet the emperor's prowess in shooting proved himself the best shot among reigning royalties.

The Czar's favorite shooting grounds are at Gatchina and Tsarkoe Selo, near St. Petersburg. Nicholas II. also shoots in the wild districts of the Bialowieski Forest in Poland. He is the best sportsman in the imperial Russian preserves, but as the breed is almost extinct these animals are only hunted every third year.

King Leopold of Belgium is a thorough sportsman and a capital shot, chamois hunting being almost a passion.

King Edward of England likes the shooting of birds and deer, popular in Great Britain, but not entailing hardships and perils which sharpen the sport of some of his brother sovereigns.
