A Stiff Night Fight Near Hayana—Engagements at Vessel Goes to Pleces on Many Points Reported.

Havana, Aug. 30.-A fight took place last night at Calabazar, Havana Province, between insurgents and rural guards, with the result that the latter retreated, with one man wounded.

An engagement between insurgents and Government troops is reported to have occurred last night near Artemisa, Province of Pinar Del Rio, near the Havana border. The result is not known.
