6. Tin cans, bottles, drockery and other non-combustible articles must be placed with the ashes and not with the garbage.



Foe Disputing Ground Foot by Foot in Plateau North of Soissons - The French Army Met With Heavy Resistance Along Canal-du-Nord.

With the French Army in France, Aug. 29.—The Germans are making a supreme effort to maintain their positions on the plateau north of Soissons. They are throwing fresh troops against both the French and the Americans, and are disputing the ground foot by foot. After the unsuccessful enemy attempts a few days ago to retake the heights west of the Soissons, Couchyle-Chateau road, known as the Ormede-Monteccuve, prisoners taken by one three different divisions of infantry and two battalions of crack mountain troops.
