HAWKER AND GRIEVE BELIEVED TO HAVE **FALLEN AMONG BERGS** 

Opinion of Experts Is That the Machine Collapsed Short Way Out.

COLD CONGEALED OIL?

Wireless Apparatus Is Also Thought To Have Failed Soon After Start.

St. Johns, Nfld., May 21.—The lack of news regarding the Sopwith airmen continues to greatly depress all here. The opinion of airmen and others now is that the machine must have collapsed within a short time after leaving St. John's, because no wireless message was ever received from the airmen nor any indication of their being afloat during the five or six hours necessary to bring them into the liner track, which they should have reached before nightfall, owing to the length of the daylight period in this latitude at the present time.

BE MADE TO FLY

St. Johns, Nfld., May 21.—The skeleton of Frederick Raynham's Martinsyde plane, a thing of frail appearance, stripped of its covering of linen and veneer, was set up in a repair shop today to be reassembled. It seemed a slight structure for the burden assigned it and with the forward parts vrenched and torn, a vehicle of doubtful strength to brave the passage of the upper regions of the Atlantic. This view is held by Capt. C. W. F. Morgan, who declared today that he could not put his former faith in a machine so damaged as the Martinsyde was in the crash of Sunday. His statement indicated that he would not fly with Raynham in his second attempt to win fame, for which the machine is being rebuilt. However, Capt. Morgan said he did not concur in the opinion of physicians who told him that the injuries he sustained on Sunday put an end to his flying days. Capt. Morgan said when he recovered from his injuries he would make an effort to obtain a new plane and start an independent flight for the British Isles. Raynham is of the onion

GERMANY'S CABINET DECLARES TREATY WILL NOT BE SIGNED; CLAIMS IT MEANS UTTER RUIN

Statement Authorized by Government Ministers Says That To Accept Terms Means D egradation of the Entire German Nation, and E conomic Destruction.

Berlin, May 20.—"Germany declines to sign the peace terms laid before it because they spell the economic destruction, political dishonor and moral degradation of the entire German nation, not only for the present, but also for still unborn generations," was a statement authorized by the Cabinet this morning through the Associated Press.

"That these consequences must logically follow acceptance of the peace conditions the American press itself has recognized without question," the statement continues. "Toward them Germany took the standpoint that acceptance of such conditions could not be demanded, and that the Entente was unjustified in imposing Calls It "Song of Hate."

"Germany has not only a moral right to compliance with the general promises made it, but a firmly-grounded, definite, clearly-defined claim, according to the basic rules of international law, on all the Entente powers, and especially on the United States. A specific recognition of the right of Germany and of the German people to a peace of right and ustice instead of the paragraphed song of hate which was written at Verailles, is contained in the note of the thereican Secretary of State Lansing In it the secretary of state notified

In it the secretary of state notified the Swiss minister in Washington unconditionally that the established basis of President Wilson's fourteen points should be authoritative for the peace conditions. Secretary Lansing announced further that the Entente governments, after careful consideration, were also prepared to recognize the conditions set up by President Wilson as the basis for the conclusion of peace.

"The declaration of rights emanating from these specific declarations of all the Entente powers and the U. S. constitutes Germany's sole asset in the general moral breakdown of all international politics which has found unsurpassable expression in the Versailes terms.
