

Pierre le Noir was the third person to be executed on charges arising out of attempts made by German agents to conduct a "defeatist" campaign in 1925 and 1916. The others who met death as a result of revelations made against them were Bolo Pasha, executed April 17, 1918, and M. Duval, who faced the firing squad July 17, 1918. Both were directors of the Germanophile newspaper Bonnet Rouge.

Le Noir was doomed to death on May 8, 1919, and desperate but fruitless efforts were made to gain a commutation


