MAY USE INDUSTRIAL **AREA FOR AERODROME**

Town Planning Committee To Consider Matter Shortly.

Establishment of a municipal aerodrome will be one of the first questions considered by London's new town-planning committee. Indications so far point to the likelihood of the city's industrial area being used for this purpose temporarily. Plenty of level land is available there, and accommodation could be

provided uptil decision is made to estab-lish a permanent base.

The scheme at first sight was regard-ed as rather visionary, but local busi-nessmen are now beginning to look on it. with importance. The industries here will not be able to use aircraft or re-ceive or ship goods by aircraft until an aerodrome has been licensed and estab-

It is practically certain that such a project will be kept under municipal control from the first, and will not de-velop under private ownership as the other lines of communication did. Air regulations passed this year un-doubtedly imply that for international, interpovincial and internal communica-tion or transport by aircraft the estab-lishment and operation of air harbors

It is pointed out that the development of commercial aviation will be very seriously retarded unless action is taken at once by the various municipalities.

Passenger traffic by aircraft to and from London cannot be operated until an airharbor is established.

The town planning committee will likely arrange for an official of the air board to visit the city and consult with them regarding the size of the grounds. them regarding the size of the grounds
