Blisters in ivy poisoning, unlike the blisters of burns, should be opened early and often, by puncture with a flamed or soaped needle, and the contents pressed out on a clean towel and learnfully kent from content with sound. carefully kept from contact with sound skin, for the serum or fluid also contains the poisonous substance. The same alkaline moist compresses should be kept on after opening the blisters. When the inflammation passes its high roduct then a dressing of freshly prethen a dressing of freshly preared zinc oxide ointment may

used.

Numerous methods of immunization against ivy poisoning are known. Some people venture to eat occasionally some of the poison ivy leaves in the spring, and believe they thereby gain immunity which lasts through that season. This may be all right. I do not recommend it. It is better, perhaps to take internally, early in the season, minute and gradually increasseason, minute and gradually increasing doses of a tincture of ivy leaf in order to acquire immunity which will endure at least through the summer.

A VARNISHED DRAIN BOARD.

The ideal sink has two drain boards, one on each side. "Then the dishes to be washed and the vegetables and fruits to be prepared start from the left, pass through the sink and are placed ready on the right. There is no confusion, or doubling back of the work. The drain boards ought to be made of good wood, oak or maple, to slope toward the sink enough to give

good drainage, to be grooved, and, above all, to be of one piece without cracks to collect dirt.

A drain board of good hard wood is till difficult to keep looking well, for still difficult to keep looking well, for the constant wetting darkens the wood, and fruit stains are very difficult to remove. If, however, it is given two or three good coats of spar varnish and thoroughly dried, it has a hard, smooth finish, which will withstand any kind of usage. It will not blister with heat; very hot water may be poured on it without in any way affecting the polish. Grease, fruit stains and soil generally brease, fruit stains and soil generally an be removed by washing with a hot

A good quality of spar varnish has all these virtues, but ordinary poor varnish which does not withstand heat is not worth the time it takes to put it on; it makes just more trouble.

If space is limited in the kitchen, rather than do without your drainboards, have them hinged, so that they can be fastened up against the wall when not in use. If you must have a washing tub in the kitchen, have it next to the sink, and hinge your drain board to the sink, and hinge your drain board. washing tub in the kitchen, have it next to the sink, and hinge your drain board to it as a cover. You could readily dispense with a table better than with your drain boards, for they can be used in practically every case where a table is needed, but a table is no substitute for them.


