SHOULD OPPOSE GOVT. CHOICES IN EVERY RIDING

Liberal Leader Urges No Acclamations For Autocratic Regime.

RETURNS TO OTTAWA

Mackenzie King Preparing For Series of Meetings in Ontario.

OTTAWA, July 20.—If the wishes of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Opposition, are complied with there will be no acclamations for any Government candidate in any by-election now or in the future pending. Mr. King is firmly of the conviction that opposition should be offered, not only to ordinary Government candidates in by-elections, but to the two new ministers, Hon. Messrs. McCurdy and Wigmore, in Colchester and St. John, respectively.

"The Government," declared the leader of the Opposition this afternoon, "has usurped all the rights of a free people. A new Government has been formed and a new leader appointed. It is now preparing for a general election. I sincerely hope and trust that in the various provinces and localities the people will take action to free it that their rights in the securing of a responsible government and a representative parliament are not further usurped, and that Opposition candidates will be put in the field everywhere where the Government holds a by-election."

The leader of the Opposition is back to work after a short stay at Kingston. He is now preparing for the holding of a series of meetings in Ontario, and has already arranged to speak at eight different points in the province, making North York his headquarters during the month. In September he will proceed directly west to British Columbia and work eastward, addressing meetings on the way.

BISHOP PROHIBITS CLERGY FROM WORK IN SINN FEIN COURTS

Prelate Also Puts Ban On Mention of Strikers' Collections.

LONDON, July 20.—The Nationalist newspapers of Dublin announce that the Right Rev. William Codd, Catholic Bishop of Ferns, County Wexford, has prohibited the clergy of his diocese from participating in Sinn Fein arbitration courts, and has refused to allow the clergy to announce collections in aid of the railwaymen, who are striking against carrying munitions, says a dispatch to the London Times from Dublin.

The newspapers add, the dispatch continues, that Bishop Codd is the first prelate, indeed, the first priest to take such action.

BOARD PLACES O.K. ON 24-CENT PRICE OF SUGAR BURN BUILDINGS

Commerce Commissioners Approve Quotation by Refiners.

OTTAWA, July 20.—

By Canadian Press.—In an order issued by the board of commerce, this afternoon approval is given by the board to the action of sugar refiners in fixing prices at 24 cents per pound. It is also provided that the sale of granulated sugar at a price higher than 26 cents per pound, plus freight if any, will be held by the board to have been made at a price which includes an unfair profit. The order states that where sales in small quantities are demanded and by reason of currency limitations it is impossible to make exact payment for sugar in exact conformity with provisions of the order, then if the dealer, if made, shall be for 26c, but in such cases the dealer may refuse to sell only one pound and may require purchase of four pounds, whereupon the price shall be one dollar and five cents for four pounds.

The same rule will prevail in regard to two-pound and three-pound sales. The order also says that while refiners' prices are 24 cents or under, basins as aforesaid, sales of granulated sugar at a price higher than 26 cents per pound will be unable to resist such sugar at 24 cents per pound plus freight and at the same time realize thereon, freight paid, a margin profit or gross profit of two cents per pound, will be held by this board to include an unfair profit.

Constables Get Out of Hand, Following Killing of Two Officers.

TUAM, County Galway, Ireland, July 20.—

There was promiscuous shooting, and several buildings were burned, including the town hall, in an outbreak here early this morning, resulting, according to the townspeople, from the killing of two policemen near Tuam last evening.

The firing began at 5 o'clock, arousing the inhabitants and driving them to shelter. Later, fires were started in different parts of the town, doing \$100,000 damage, according to the Press Association. The military forces were called out, but were soon withdrawn. The number of casualties was unknown up to this afternoon.

The policemen killed were Constables Carey and Burke. They were shot dead when returning from the Galway assizes by a party of from 40 to 50 armed men, who had blocked the road with felled trees and waited in ambush until the car in which Carey and Burke, with a sergeant and another constable, were riding, came in sight. Observing the obstruction, Carey and Burke alighted and fired upon the assailants until their ammunition was exhausted. They were then overpowered and killed. The bodies of the two constables were found in the road and ordered to return to Tuam.

The police and military became active shortly afterwards, and it is alleged that they sacked the town, shots being fired into houses and shops. Buildings were set afire, and the town hall was wrecked.

FLAX PULLING BY MACHINES NOT YET SATISFACTORY

One Hundred Flax Men Witnessed Trial At Jeannette's Creek.

JEANNETTE'S CREEK, July 20.—Nearly 100 leading flax growers of the United States and Canada, representatives of leading linen and thread manufacturing companies, commercial and export agency representatives, and officials from the agricultural departments of Canada, Ontario, the United States, Michigan, and other states and provinces, attended a demonstration of flax-pulling by two flax harvesters on the Bruce Bradley farm near here today.

The demonstration was not exactly a complete success, although both of the two machines demonstrated did pull some flax. The Vessot machine, being manufactured under the name of the Perfection Flax Harvester, got around the field all right with a comparatively few number of stops, but appeared to lack endurance for uninterrupted work. It made the best showing at the morning demonstration, but the Tombyll machine, manufactured by the International Harvester Company, was still in the field this afternoon with a corps of mechanics endeavoring to get it working right. The latter machine arrived in parts this morning, and may have suffered considerably from a too hurried assembling. The Vessot machine had been on the ground for several days, but had not pulled a great deal of flax.

Machines Compared. Powerful belts pressed closely together and driven by a gasoline engine, which is part of the machine, constitute the pulling mechanism of the Vessot machine, which was hauled by a Cleveland Tractor. The Tombyll machine, which resembles a grain binder in appearance, and is drawn by horses, relies on heavy rubber cylinders revolving inwards in an upright position to uproot the flax, which is then carried by canvas carriers up to the binding board. The Tombyll machine had the advantage of reels to bend the flax towards the pulling mechanism, but in the demonstration did not harvest as clean a swath as the Vessot. A weak point of the Vessot appeared to be the lack of any apparatus to bend the flax towards the pulling mechanism, and the binding apparatus permitted the heads of one sheaf to become interlocked with another.

However, the consensus of opinion appeared to be that on favorable grounds in flax not too thin nor too heavy and free from weeds, both machines would probably give fair satisfaction.

INVESTIGATION OF FIRES RESULTS IN ARREST OF FARMER

Deputy Reeve Hugh McClean of Collingwood Held On Serious Charge.

OWEN SOUND, July 20.—A well-known county councillor of Grey, Hugh McClean, deputy reeve of Collingwood, was placed under arrest last night about midnight. He is charged with charged with the several insurance companies. The arrest created a big sensation, particularly around the village of Ravenna, where McClean lives.

Fire Cause Arrest. It is alleged that three fires have occurred recently on McClean's farm, the damage on each occasion amounting to a considerable amount. It is understood that an investigation followed, and the circumstances led to the arrest of the young man last night. Crown-Attorney, T. H. Dyre, left for Thornbury early this morning to arrange for the arrest of McClean. The preliminary hearing will take place at Meaford on Friday.

McCLean is a young farmer, and his farm is at Ravenna, about eight miles from Thornbury. This was his first year as a member of the county council.

LIBERALS HAVE CANDIDATES IN EVERY COUNTY

Acclamations Absent As Result of Nomination Day in Nova Scotia.

HALIFAX, July 20.—Today was nomination day for the provincial elections in Nova Scotia on July 27, and there will be contests in every county.

The Liberals have candidates in every county except Colchester, where Liberal and Conservative Farmers are opposing the straight Conservatives.

The Conservatives have no candidates in Antigonish and Gushoret Counties, and only one candidate in Pictou County, Yarmouth and Hants. In these counties the Farmers are opposing the Liberals.

HEWITT ALLOWED OUT ON \$5,000 BAIL TILL DECEMBER SESSIONS

ST. THOMAS, July 20.—Allen Hewitt, London, late manager of the refreshment booth at Springbank, who is charged with robbing a Pere Marquette car, which was passing over the L. & P. S. R., of considerable merchandise over a week ago, has elected to be tried at the quarter sessions in December. Bail bonds for \$5,000 were furnished today for Hewitt's temporary release. 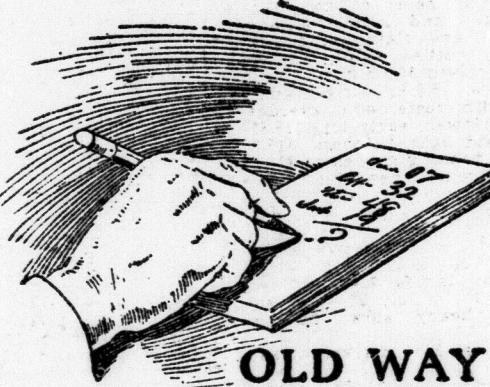

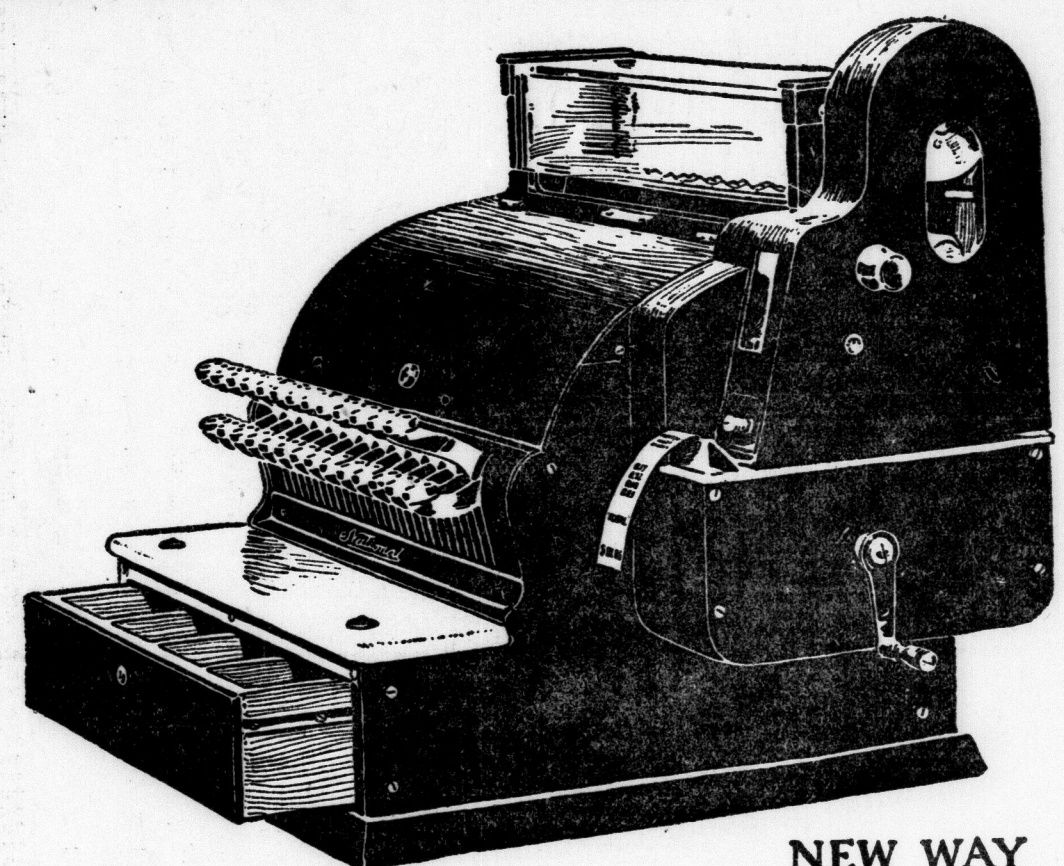
