An extra tax of \$1 per 1,000 was levied on cigars early in the war, and now on top of the increase on imported tobacco. a one per cent tax is collected on all sales.

If the Government had put another dollar per thousand on the manufacture of cigars, it would have been less irksome to the trade, it is said, and they might have collected the increase. As it is, the Government is not collecting any additional revenue from the cigar industry, the heavy increase on the importation of tobacco having discouraged importations so that the actual collections at 28 cents per pound is less than they were at 18 cents.

A good demand for certain sizes in rope and of binder twine is reported, and prices are steady. The situation for fall for window glass is regarded as rather serious, indications pointing to a likelihood of supplies being small if fuel and transportation difficulties do not become easier. Collections generally are satisfactory.
