FOUNDRY FIRE AT BROCKVILLE

James Smart Company Scorched—Loss Four Thousand.

BROCKVILLE, March 4.—(Special.)—There was a stiff breeze this afternoon for the best part of an hour at the big factory of the James Smart Company, which made a wreck of the roof of the foundry department.

An overhead shaft produced a flame which spread to the oil-soaked roof and made great headway along a row of skylights running the full length of the structure. This was blazing fiercely when the firemen arrived. Three lines of hose, under an excellent pressure, saved the day. The fire had gotten so close a start that at one time it threatened complete destruction of the building. The loss is estimated at about \$4,000, covered by insurance.

FIRE DEPARTMENT'S APPROPRIATION CUT

Suit May Be Entered Against Cataract Co. for Damages by Electrolysis—General City News.

HAMILTON, March 4.—(Special.)—The fire and water committee decided this evening that it would require \$32,000 this year for construction, and the council will be asked to appropriate that sum. It is the intention to ask the government for permission to issue debentures for that amount.

The appropriation of the fire department was cut down to \$26,500, although that is nearly \$13,000 less than the committee wants. It does not provide for the clothing for the firemen, which amounts to \$480.

K. L. Aitken will be engaged to gather information so that a suit may be entered against the Cataract Power Co. for damage alleged to have been caused by electrolysis.

A. Whitney was added to the strength of the fire department. Willie Olds, Alkman-avenue, son of Conductor Olds of the street railway, was seriously injured on Wentworth street this evening while bobbing.

The conservators appointed a special committee this evening to bring in recommendations with reference to officers for the club.

Was An Adopted Boy.

Referring to the special despatch from Buffalo, published in The World Wednesday morning, Louis Strauss, North James-street, explains that the Louis Strauss referred to as being charged with bigamy is his foster brother. The missing man was adopted when he was a baby by the Strauss family in Rochester, and he lived in Hamilton until 12 years ago.

It has been agreed that any new agreement made with the street railway must be sanctioned by the ratepayers before being adopted by the city council.

A man giving the name of W. Ryan is accused of trying to cash a cheque for \$250 bearing the forged signature of R. R. Simpson, Hotel Royal. Just as he presented the cheque at the bank the cashier told him that he had entered the bank and the man disappeared.

Jail Yawns for Editors. At police court this morning M. J. O'Reilly complained because he had been unable to obtain bail for his client, J. P. Scanlon, because the newspapers had published a story that Scanlon was charged with killing a man. Police Magistrate Jelfs remarked that some fine day the newspaper editors would be sent to jail for a month or two for publishing comments on cases before they were tried.

The financial statement of the Dominion Power and Transmission Company for the year 1905 was mailed to the shareholders today. It shows that the gross earnings of the company were \$1,461,757 and that the net earnings amounted to \$312,403, of which \$212,430 was paid in dividends. The company's assets amount to \$1,211,142.

John Holland, 257 North Catharine-street, set fire to his house this morning while thawing out a water pipe and a torch. The loss amounted to about \$300.

William Maxwell, formerly a sergeant in the Argyl and Sutherland Highlanders, was appointed sergeant-major of the 81st Highland.

Police Officer Resigns. On account of illness, etc., a Major Prentice today at noon sent in his resignation as a member of the police force. The resignation was accepted.

"EDUCATE PEOPLE TO EAT WHITE PEACH," SAYS HALE

"It's No Use; We Cannot Sell 'Em," Says Mr. Smith, M.P.—Fruit Growers' Convention.

GRIMSBY, Ont., March 4.—(Special.)—The three days' convention of Niagara Peninsula Fruit Growers opened at Grimsby this afternoon, when the town hall was crowded to the doors, with intelligent men from Hamilton to Niagara River. W. H. Bunting, president of the association, presided, and complimented the growers upon the complete union of growers of the entire district.

J. H. Hale, South Glastonbury, Conn., the peach king of the United States, was the principal speaker. Mr. Hale, who is a peach grower and is afraid to think out, but is now a peach grower, pointed out that this luscious fruit can be grown in almost every region and not in a few favored districts. Last year over 11,000 carloads of cantaloupes alone had been carried in the States. Fruit no longer is a luxury, but a finer quality of fruit, like the peach, is the most profitable.

It is not much good, but people like it and will buy it, and the grower is to keep up until the hanging fruit prevents. Low trees were also advocated as a great aid to money-making and he instanced a case where the grower who had followed the principle had been able to pick a whole orchard without the use of a single ladder.

Fruit is often spoiled, he said, because the grower is too greedy and is afraid to thin out, but if peaches are not allowed to grow closer than eight to ten inches apart it will give a finer quality of fruit. The white peach is better than the yellow, and more profitable.

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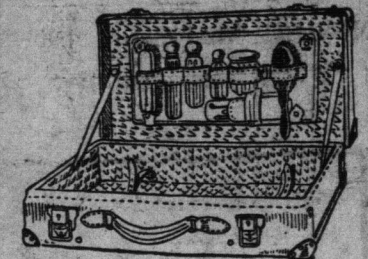
