LICENSE REDUCTION IS CARRIED

OUTLYING DISTRICTS SWEEP BYLAW THRU BY MAJORITY OF OVER 1100

The Anti-Reductionists Were Given Cause for Hope at First But the Late Returns Proved Disastrous.

The carrying of the license reduction bylaw, or more properly referendum, since it rests with the city council to pass the formal measure, was undoubtedly due to the large turnout of women voters.

It is to be noted that while the fourth, fifth and sixth wards gave majorities for reduction, the first, second and third were very pronounced in their hostility.

With a plurality voter than has been—about 7000—Joseph Oliver may enter upon his second term as mayor of Toronto.

There were present at the Ontario License and Allied Trades' Association to receive returns, James Haverson, K.C., solicitor for the association; W. J. Boland and P. J. Miquelin, members of the executive of many other members of the association.

When the final result was learned, that the bylaw carried by a small majority when compared to the very large vote polled, there was a general expression of opinion that it would be an injustice to force a reduction of licenses on the people of Toronto and deprive so many hotelkeepers of their means of livelihood without granting some compensation.

The Dominion Government had established a precedent by declining to pass total prohibition because of a small majority, and likewise in the referendum vote under the regime of Hon. G. W. Ross.


Mr. Oliver's vote last year totaled 14,000, expelling the total of the vote of Messrs. Geary and Beattie Nesbitt.

HYDRO POWER IN DECEMBER

Hon. Adam Beck Speaks to Enthusiastic Meeting in Brantford—Lloyd Harris, M.P., Opposed.

BRANTFORD, Jan. 1.—(Special.)—Hon. Adam Beck and J. W. Lyon addressed an enthusiastic meeting of ratepayers here to-night on the power bylaw.

850 Violent Deaths In Montreal In Year

Twenty-three From Foul Play, Ten Italians Being Murdered

MONTREAL, Jan. 1.—(Special.)—The morgue returns for the year show that there were 850 violent deaths.

Twenty-three died from foul play, ten Italians were murdered, 29 suicides, 79 drowned in the St. Lawrence, 50 killed in the railways, 25 by street railway, 15 by explosions, 218 sudden deaths, 67 burned and 4 scalded to death.
