HARD TO MAN THE NAVY

Sir George French Says Sailors Will Have to Be Imported.

MONTREAL, Sept. 3.—That Canada will have to import her sailors and her marines for the proposed navy is the statement of General Sir George French, best known in Canada as the organizer of the Northwest Mounted Police in 1870-4. His service embraces five continents.

He is strongly in favor of local navies for Australia and Canada, but says that wages are so high in both countries that the right kind of men will not go into the navies.

Within fifty years he says the west will swing the east, owing to the increase in population.

State-owned railways, in Australia, he says, are a success, paying 3-1/2 per cent. but that they have only been since governed by independent commissions. When they were under the government there was graft, and the roads lost money.

He leaves for the Pacific coast tomorrow.

Excavation Adjoining Caused Building to Fall In.
BRANTFORD, Sept. 3.—(Special.)—Owing to building operations being conducted on Dalhousie-street, by the Brantford Realty Company, the building known as the Brantford garage collapsed at 7 o'clock this evening, burying five automobiles in the debris, including a new Russell car. An excavation next to the building it is thought caused the collapse, and the two employees by good fortune were outside at the time. They had a narrow escape. The loss will be heavy.

Tenders for Winnipeg Power Plant.
WINNIPEG, Sept. 3.—Tenders for \$425,000 of equipment for the civic power plant was accepted by the city council this afternoon. The lowest tender was from the Winnipeg Electric Co., \$37,150; Vickers, Sons & Maxim, \$38,050; Canadian Westinghouse Co., Limited, Hamilton, \$39,000; Canadian General Electric Co., Toronto, \$41,000; Canadian Fairbanks Co., Winnipeg, \$44,900; Canada Foundry Co., Limited, Toronto, \$27,520; Canadian Fairbanks Co., \$29,950.

Former Toronto Boy Scores in Guatemala.
Archie Summerhayes, second son of W. F. Summerhayes, Broadview-avenue, is home after having been away five years. For years he was an officer in the mercantile marine, and has sailed before the mast on nearly every sea. It was while sailing he was offered and accepted the position of terminal agent of the Guatemala Central Railway in Guatemala, one of the Central American republics. He is stationed at San Jose on the Pacific seaboard. There is a population of 1,000,000 in Guatemala, the greater number being Aztecs.

While there is a goodly number of Germans, British and Americans.
The German and the British handle the larger volume of the foreign trade. During the absence of British Consul D. M. Savage, at San Jose (Mr. Savage being a native of Chesley, Ont.), Mr. Summerhayes acted as vice-consul, and received the usual salute from a British squadron visiting the port. The Toronto boy leaves for the south in October, greatly benefited in health by his trip north.

ALD. BAIRD PROTESTS DELAY IN WARD 7 PAVING

Protection at Dufferin Crossing.

The committee on works heard a vigorous protest at the city hall yesterday afternoon from Ald. Baird. That representative of Ward 7 declared that it was a question if West Toronto would have agreed to annexation if such delay had been anticipated as had occurred with respect to paving and other urgent improvements.

City Engineer Rust explained that the delay complained of was in consequence of the time allowed for notices to property owners required by law.

Ald. Foster expressed the views of the committee on the granting of water main extensions to persons living just outside the city boundaries. He considered the territory within the city limits as being a part of the city, and that no further outside water services should be granted.

The waterworks department was instructed to make a report on the number of persons outside the city limits now using city water, the cost of its supply, and the revenue produced.

The city engineer reported that at the request of W. E. Gillette, G.T.R. superintendent, he had written the chief constable calling attention to the dangerous condition of the bridge near the exhibition, asking that one or two uniformed constables be stationed there to assist the three railway men on duty there as they were unable to control the public. Mr. Gillette was afraid that some accident might occur.

The initial steps were authorized for the construction of a new sewer for the district between Sunnyside-avenue and High Park, the Lake Shore-road and Bloor-street. The cost is estimated at \$25,000. The drainage benefited will be charged about \$1.94 a foot.

The property owners on the west side of Ossington-avenue will, by order of the committee, be notified that they must abate the nuisance dangerous to health caused by the lack of grading and drainage on their lots.

Street cleaning recommendations aggregating \$30,000 were approved. The renumbering of ward 7 to conform with the city system was authorized.

BULLET THRU BOY'S BODY
Dominic Spratt of Lindsay Shot by Deflected Bullet.

LINDSAY, Sept. 3.—(Special.)—Dominic Spratt, aged 14, son of R. P. Spratt, is in the hospital in a very critical condition. He was shot through the stomach after this afternoon by a .22 calibre rifle bullet, which was deflected by striking the water after Jake Smith had shot a man. The boy was in a lot of trouble, 50 yards away. The bullet went thru the body.

ERIN'S CROPS.
Buckwheat and Potatoes Are Plentiful This Year.

E. Kiliver, in writing The World from Fergus about his trips there the surrounding country, says that the buckwheat crop is unusually good, and that the potatoes are also plentiful.

"I have reached here, after traversing the townships of Chinguacousy and principally Erin; I passed a look note of all the live stock of the district when riding or walking. By far the greatest number of cattle are the short-horns and the fewest are Jerseys. The country is a pasture of about 100 acres, belonging to Adam Boyne, who keeps about half of the farm for feeding purposes."

In the past two days I saw more buckwheat growing in North Erin than all the other years in Canada; excepting the year 1908, when the crop was a failure. The crop is now in the hands of the market, and the price is high.

The roadside many sheep browsing; the only weed left growing being the clover. The potatoes are growing well in the townships, and are expected to be a good crop.

FARMERS' INSTITUTE CLUBS.
The past winter has seen a good deal of activity along this line of institute work. The Farmers' Institute clubs are giving more and more prominence to the establishment of local organizations thru which the farmers can get together and exchange ideas, and applying the lessons of the agricultural lectures. These local organizations form a splendid means thru which the state or provincial department can arrange for meetings to be addressed by specialists along the various lines of agricultural activity.

There is no doubt but that the coming winter will see a great many additional clubs formed, and with a view to placing the work upon a sound basis, it has been decided to call a meeting of representatives of some of the more successful clubs of the province for September 15th. The meeting will be held in the Agricultural Institute building, and will be held at 2 p.m. and all institute members, whether or not they are officers of a riding or club institute, will be made welcome.

Methods of organization and work for local clubs formed a prominent feature of the discussions at the American Association of Farmers' Institutes Workers, held in Portland on August 16th and 17th. The provincial superintendent has gathered information from the various clubs, and is planning the campaign for the coming season.

Rails Will Be on the Ground Early Next Week.
