ARREST CHURCH MEMBER LEAVING FOR SCOTLAND

Chas. Campbell Accused of Theft of \$28 From St. Philip's Congregation.

HAMILTON, Dec. 12.—(Special.)—From a trusted member of St. Philip's Anglican Church in the east end of the city to call in No. 3 police station is the deacon made in a few hours by Charles Campbell, 634 East Barton-street, 29 years of age. He was arrested stepping into a G.T.R. train to make a journey to his old home in Scotland. The charge is that he stole \$28 he collected for the church. At the pressed to turn the amount over he kept putting it off until the church officials became suspicious. He had a railway ticket to Montreal, and a third-class steamer ticket. He was setting out on the journey with just 32 cents.

Judge Snider told the jury that the evidence of a self-confessed criminal did not carry the weight of an ordinary citizen. Dunsmore, the carter, swore Neville was not present.

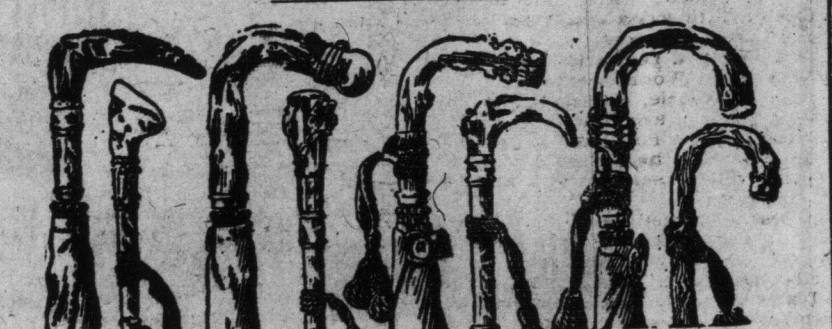

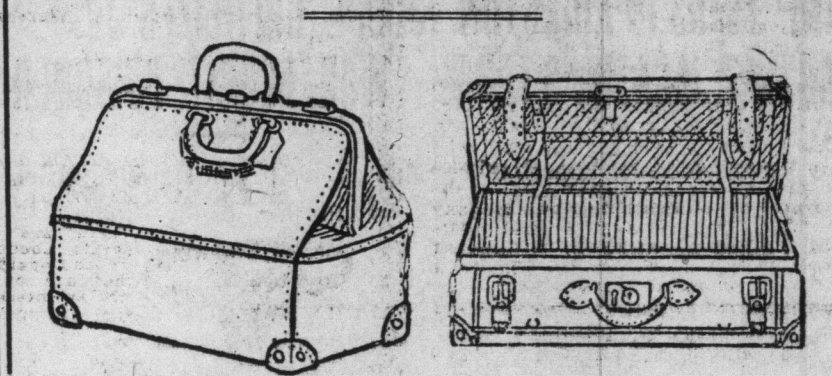
