

# \* WAR SUMMARY THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

The British battlefront continues to be the centre of great artillery duels. After the repulse of his infantry at-After the repuise of his infantry at-tacks against Passchendaele on the pre-ceding day, the enemy did not return to the combat yesterday, but kept up a voluminous bombardment with his di-verse-calibred artillery. The enemy is

preparing to resist further advances into Belgium with desperation, because the gaining of much further ground by the British army in the next few weeks would be disastrous to the coming German peade drive. The British Government and the British higher command, however, are set upon winding up the campaign with a decided military success. Political reasons demand a gain of territory. The British advance will therefore proceed. The only adverse factor to its rapid suc-cess would be a further demand for large British reinforcements for Italy. The Belgians, in conjunction with the British, are exerting a powerful pressur-against the Dixmude sallent. Its loss by the Germans is merely a matter of time. The object of Shr Doughas Haig is to broaden the base of his advance into Bel-gium. His opening phase of the Flanders

The object of Sir Dougias Haig is to broaden the base of his advance into Bel-gium. His opening phase of the Flanders campaign drove a wedge into the Ger-man line and secured the retention of this wedge by the seizure of the remain-ing high ground. The next stage is, while keeping up the bombardment of the German communications thru Roulers, to enlarge the front of the British advance by attacking the exposed sections of the uerman line left standing on each side of the wedge. The new front gained by the fighting roughly extends from the Menin road to the Houthulst Wood. South of the Menin coad hes the ridge of Zandevoorde. The capture of this position would enable the British to seize the passages of the River Lys at Menin and to advance behind Lille. The British campaign so far, however, has aimed at the driving of the Germans from the coast of Belgium. The next phase of the campaign will probably see this ob-ject accomplished.

Owing to the signal breaking down of In Palestine, by latest reports, British troops, overcoming slight resistance, reached the Ludd-Er Ramle line, three miles south of Jaffa. The mounted New Zealanders effectively dealt with a coun-ter-attack launched by a Turkish regi-ment, They charged right into the Turks with the bayonet and drove them back with heavy losses. The British have taken 9000 prisoners since Oct. 31. Thus in two weeks they have driven the Turks from positions as strong as those on the
