MRS. MULOCK RECEIVES THREE THOUSAND MONTHLY

Master-in-Ordinary Issues Order Settling Alimony to Be Paid.

According to a lengthy report issued by George Alcorn, master-inordinary at Osgoode Hall, yesterday. Mrs. Adele Baldwin Mulock is to receive \$3000 a month alimony from her husband, Cawthra Mulock. The reference was made to the master at the trial held on April 30, and the amount of alimony to be paid was agreed upon by both parties. The money is to be deposited in the Dominion Bank on the fifth days of January. April. July and October of each year, the first payment to be made on July 5 of this Year.

Cawthra Mulock is to have the right, upon ten days' notice in writing to the plaintiff, to deliver to her in substitution of 1160 shares of the Eastern Construction Co.. either cash to the amount of \$75,000. or other securities amounting to that value. This transaction is by virtue of a marriage settlement made on June 23,

The plaintiff is to make a declaration of trust, providing and appor-tioning of moneys or securities that are subject to the marriage agree-ment. Should trouble arise over the stocks substituted for the \$75,000, the case is to be settled by the supreme court. Upon the death of Mrs. Mulock, the money in question is to be shared equally amongst the four children, with a provision that in case of the death of any child leaving any of the children under 21 years bedeceased child shall be divided amongst the survivors.
