FIRST CANADIAN BEANS SELLING ON WHOLESALE

Shipment Arrived on Market Yesterday and Brought Dollar a Basket.

SCARCITY OF CHERRIES

Crop is Reported to Be Very Short—No Demand for Cucumbers.

Strawberry shipments about equal Monday's in point of quantity, being much heavier in the morning and lighter in the afternoon, the price ranging from 40 to 50 per box, the bulk going to the east. The first Canadian beans for this season were received in the morning, and were of excellent quality, selling at \$1 per 11-quart basket. Priddy Wigle and the white Canada Co-operative Association, both of Kingsville, sent in fine shipments to White & Co. The prospect for cherries will be quite scarce this season, as the crop is reported to be less than half as heavy as last year's. They came in in slightly larger quantities yesterday, and were a good sale. The choice black currants bringing from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per six-quart basket, and \$2 to \$2.50 per 11-quart basket; the white currants, \$1 to \$1.25 per six-quart basket, and \$1 to \$1.25 per 11-quart basket. Cucumbers are becoming a drug on the market, as there is no demand for them. It being hard work to secure \$1 per 11-quart basket for them yesterday. The first American bag onions for this season came in yesterday from Louisville, N. Y., being a car, selling at \$2.50 per 75-lb. bag. The green peas which came in were mostly the common variety, and did not sell nearly so well as the better brands, bringing \$2 to \$4 per six-quart basket, and \$10 to \$12 per quart basket.

INFANTILE PARALYSIS IS ALARMING NEW YORK

Twenty-Six Children Succumbed in Period of Twenty-Four Hours.

NEW YORK, July 4.—Twenty-six children have died from the epidemic of infantile paralysis in New York within the last twenty-four hours, according to an announcement made this afternoon by Dr. Haven Emerson, health commissioner. In Brooklyn alone, 191 new cases were reported for observation. Thirty extra medical inspectors were summoned at noon and sent out to investigate reports of additional cases. More than 100 persons, among them two adults, now have died of the disease since the epidemic began on June 26. Many fathers were sending their families out of town today to stay until the epidemic has been checked.

DISCUSS HYDRO RATES FOR YORK TOWNSHIP

Regarding hydro rates for York Township, a conference was held yesterday between Sir Adam Beck, J. R. Starr, K. C., Reeve F. Griffith and Clerk of the Township W. H. Clarke. After the question of price had been thoroughly gone into, and after the difficulties in the way of construction had been discussed at length, it was decided to arrange a conference between the hydro engineers, the Toronto Hydro Commissioners and the township council that the matter might be gone into again in detail.
