The King Saw England

Beat Scots at Rugby

London, March 21.—King George and party, who are on their subjects visited England's defeat of Scotland in the international rugby game on Saturday, by two goals and one try, to a drop-kick goal. Oxford and Cambridge

Runners Coming Over

Philadelphia, March 21.—Oxford and Cambridge were represented in the twenty-sixth annual relay carnival of the University of Pennsylvania on Franklin field on Saturday, April 30 and May 1 by a team of runners who will contest the two-mile college relay championship of America.

This announcement was made last night after Murdoch Kendrick, chairman of the Cambridge track committee, had received a cable message that the English universities would send over a combination of the message stated that the English team would consist of the following: Rudd, Montague and Kilgus of Oxford, and Montague, Tatham and Gregory of Cambridge. They will be accompanied by A. N. S. ## BLACKBURN ROVERS BEAT ASTON VILLA

Right in Birmingham, Being  
Outstanding Feature in  
British Soccer.

London, March 20.—The outstanding feature of the British soccer games by day was the defeat of Aston Villa before their own supporters by Blackburn Rovers, 2 to 1. Fifty thousand people packed into Stamford Bridge to see the other London Club in this division, the Arsenal, just lost to Middlesbrough by the only goal scored. The leaders, West Bromwich Albion, won again, beating Preston North End, and increased their lead at the top of the table in the second division. Tottenham Hotspur accounted for Rotherham County by 2 to 0, and have practically assured themselves of the championship for this season. Birmingham lost to Derby by 1 to 0, and are losing their grip on the second position, as Huddersfield Town, by beating Stockport County by 2 to 1, have increased their lead to three points.

With the exception of Middlesbrough, who lost to Plymouth Athletic, 2 to 0, the other home teams in the Southern League picked up points. No changes are made in the leading positions, but the tallenders are having a desperate struggle to escape relegation to the second division.

All the Scottish League games resulted much as expected, with the exception of the Hearts-Clyde game, which ended in a surprising away win for the latter by three clear goals.
