Sharkey arose early in the morning and went to the Fourth street and Snyder avenue police station. There where the young boxer interviewed Coroner Jermon, Superintendent of Police Taylor and Magistrate Beaton. The three officials looked up the law governing the matter and they quickly decided that they had no right to arrest the boxer, as the tragedy had occurred on Government property. Sharkey was not satisfied, however, and insisted upon going to District Attorney Rotan's office. The latter confirmed the decision of the officials, but even then Sharkey still remained worried.

Sharkey Sorry. "No one is more sorry than I am for Hagan," he said, "and if I should be arrested and even imprisoned I would rather it would happen than have any one say that I tried to dodge punishment. I don't remember hitting the boy over the heart. It looked to me Cornwall (winter assizes), Jan. 12, like a clear case of exhaustion. I didn't hit him hard enough at any time to hurt him seriously." Sharkey then went to the United

States district attorney's office in the Postoffice Building. From there the commandant's office at the Navy Yard was communicated with and soon word came over the wire that Sharkey was not wanted by the authorities.


