- 2. Were any of the thirteen grants awarded given to the Provinces of Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba or Saskatchewan and, if not, for what reason?
- 3. Is the availabilty of grants under the Programme advertised publicly and, if so (a) in what manner (b) were they advertised in the Moncton area?
 - 4. Did any local voluntary groups from the Constituency of Moncton apply?
- Hon. A. C. Abbott (Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs): 1. The Department of Consumer and Corporate Affairs Canada is in regular contact with voluntary consumer groups through its regional and district offices. This contact includes many informal requests regarding the availability of financial support from the department in addition to formal application for money under the Consumer Assistance Grants Programme. The numbers of the former type of contact have not been tabulated: formal application for grants were received from seventy local groups during the 1976-77 fiscal year.
- 2. The Department assumes that this question refers to voluntary organizations located in the provinces of Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and not to the provinces themselves, as no grants are awarded to the provincial government by the Department of Consumer and Corporate Affairs. Further, the Department assumes that this question refers to a news release dated May 19, 1977 regarding the awarding of 13 grants. None of the recipient groups had offices located in any of Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba or Saskatchewan. However, several of the groups offer services to consumers living in those provinces i.e. Allergy Information Association, Consumers' Association of Canada, and Transport 2000. At the time the news release was issued, applications from agencies located in the above listed provinces did not meet the criteria of the grants program.
- 3. National press releases regarding the Consumer Assistance Grants Programme are made on a regular basis.
- 4. No formal grant applications have been received from voluntary consumer groups from the Moncton constituency.
