REFUSE TO PAY ROUMANIA'S PRICE

Austria and Germany Decide Against Demands

MAY SOON JOIN ENTENTE

In Which Event a Perfectly Trained and Equipped Army of One Million Men Will Be Added to Kaiser's Forces

London, June 4.—"According to news from the Austrian frontier," says the Morning Post's Berlin correspondent, "the Austrian ministry met Monday—representatives from Berlin being present—to discuss the Rumanian note. It is understood that Rumania's demands will be refused. The relations between the two countries already are strained. Professor Basilescu, a Rumanian deputy, in an article in the Geneva Journal, estimates that the Rumanian army has now 1,600,000 men perfectly equipped, which will present a problem on a new 600-mile front to the Austrian strategists."

A Copenhagen despatch on April 23 quoted the Rumanian minister to Italy

as having said that Rumania had demanded cessions of territory from Austria in return for remaining neutral in the war, but that Austria had refused to acquiesce. Just what these alleged demands were was not stated, but the ministry was reported to have said that there existed a defensive alliance between Rumania and Italy and that Italy would not accept any offer from Austria without having received the sanction of Rumania.

While there have been several rumors recently concerning Rumania and the war—that she would remain neutral and that she was negotiating with the Allies and was believed to be on the brink of war—nothing has come through of any demands made on Austria.

BADLY INJURED BY BULL

Newton Farmer's Desperate Fight—Son's Rifle Ends Animal's Life

Thomas J. Davis, one of the best known residents of Newtown, had a narrow escape from death on Tuesday, when he was attacked by a bull. Mr. Davis was working in a field in which the bull was at large, when, without warning, the animal charged at him. He had only the protection of a shovel but he fought the animal with it to the best of his ability and gradually worked his way to a fence, and managed to get out of danger.

Mr. Davis was discovered badly bruised. No bones were broken but he is suffering from shock and severe bruises. After giving his father necessary attention, Albert Davis started to round up the animal, which was only two

WALL STREET AND THE WAR

Not in eight years has Wall street witnessed the activity that developed toward the end of March and continued in mill-shake days for nearly six weeks. During that time the stocks of manufacturing companies identified with foreign contracts appreciated in value more rapidly than had any other group in the history of the New York Stock Exchange.

Bethlehem Steel was the first to start. From \$80 a share it rose to approximately \$100 a share. The public was fascinated by this performance and on the slightest excuse or on the first exaggerated rumor of the troubling and quadrupling of prices within a few weeks. It became a regular thing for quotations of the stocks of ordnance to appear in the newspapers. Some of these advanced from \$300 to \$800 a share. One of them sold as high as \$1,400 a share. The craze reminded one of the tulip speculation in Holland some generations ago, and the craze for rubber, tea, and copper shares in London a decade ago. Profits that had been made from the great rise in wheat and later

in the advance in cotton were used in promoting some of the most daring stock market operations ever known. The inevitable collapse came before the Lusitania incident had happened. It is to be admitted, however, that new speculative as well as new economic forces have been established by reason of the war which will be permanent in character, and that for years to come a larger proportion of American industry will be devoted to the manufacture of armaments than would have been the case if Europe had not decided last August to argue its differences at the cannon's mouth.—From "War Contracts in the United States," by Charles F. Spence in the American Review of Reviews for June.

THE BUSINESS OF THE KRUPPS

Five separate groups of works are comprised in the Krupp organization. The first of these is the Essen steel works—with pouring grounds at Merypen, Tanager-Hutte and Essen—consisting of some sixty departments and covering an area of about 800 acres. Here are housed 7,000 machine tools, seventeen roll mills, 187 hammers, eighty-one hydraulic presses, 897 steam boilers, 869 steam engines, over 2,000 electric motors, and 800 cranes. The total coal consumed in this entire establishment last year alone was 8,000,000 tons. In this group is included also the Millhofen-Hutte, with its four blast furnaces; the Hermann-Hutte, with three blast furnaces, and the Sayner-Hutte, with coal and iron mines.

The second group consists of the Friedrich-Alfred Iron Works at Rheinhausen, with six blast furnaces, fifteen blowing engines, and Siemens-Martin steel works.

The third group is the Annen steel
