Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

ANY person who has been told of a family of any man over 18 years old, may ascertain a quarter of a century ago, in the Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the nearest Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the intended homesteader.

Notice to Contractors.

SEALING TENDERS addressed to the undersigned, and marked on the envelope "Tender for Pump system," "Water for Water system," and "Tender for Pipe Tunnels and Wiring Ducts," as the case may be, will be received at the office of the Commissioner of the Transcontinental Railway, at Ottawa, Ontario, until twelve o'clock noon of the 20th day of July, 1910, for:

(1) Air, steam, water and oil piping system.

(2) Yard Water system.

(3) Pipe tunnels and wiring ducts; required in connection with the Transcontinental Railway shops east of Winnipeg.

Each tender must be signed and sealed by all the parties to the tender, and witnessed, and be accompanied by an accepted cheque on a chartered bank of the Dominion of Canada, payable to the order of the Commissioner of the Transcontinental Railway, for a sum equal to ten per cent (10 p. c.) of the amount of the tender.

Any person whose tender is accepted shall, within ten days after the signing thereof, sign the contract, specifications, and other documents to be signed, and in any case of refusal or failure on the part of the party whose tender is accepted to complete and execute the contract, with the Commissioner, the said cheque shall be forfeited to the Commissioner as liquidated damages for each day of delay or failure, and all contract rights acquired by the acceptance of the tender shall be forfeited.

The cheques deposited by parties whose tenders are rejected will be returned within ten days after the signing of the contract. The right is reserved to reject any or all tenders.
