

NEW YORK, Oct. 18—Some of the different reviews have already indicated that there has been a falling off to some extent of buying of various manufactured goods, probably as a result of decreased purchasing power in the south. No one can tell how far this will go, but generally trade leaders believe the balance of the year will see production almost continuously at its present rate. In the meantime, however, there has been a continuous liquidation movement in the stock market and professional traders have taken advantage of the situation to attack stocks sharply and successfully. We see no change in the character of the market, but stocks were sold so heavily in the last week that the technical position is getting to be such as to warrant a sharp rally at any time, and it may come today. Naturally the stocks which were most heavily sold will be those to recover the most at present. But, on the whole, we do not think the market can maintain rallying tendencies as we rather expect higher prices to bring out considerable stock and cause another setback.
