LABOR LEADERS FORM PLANS TO FINANCE STRIKE

Union Workers To Contribute 5 Per Cent. of Wages

ARRANGE LOANS

Branches Are Not So "Broke" As Is Popularly Believed

LONDON, May 8 - British Labor General Headquarters at Eccleston Square Friday completed plans for financing the general strike. The general council of the Trades Union Congress, which is the governing body of the strike, ordered all union workers remaining at work to contribute 5 per cent. of their wages.

These contributions go to the general strike fund, which will be administered by the council. In addition, officials of the striking unionists now are arranging for large bank overdrafts which if effected will be mortgages. first, on their invested savings, and second, on membership dues which will be collected over a number of years to come.


