

CHILDREN'S AID HOME MATRON HAS RESIGNED

Committee to Choose Successor to Mrs. Leith—Twenty-Six on Roll

At the monthly meeting of the children's aid society, last night, with the first vice-president, J. E. Quinn, in the chair, a letter of resignation was received from the matron, Mrs. Leith. This was regretfully accepted and a committee was appointed with power to add to choose a lady to succeed her as head of the home.

The agent read a letter he had received from a little girl in Kings county placed in a home by the society. She had secured the prize for general standing in her school last year and had done the same this year.

Commenting on this case, Rev. H. A. Goodwin recalled that when the society intervened in this case all sorts of things were being said. She had been brought from an institution in an outside province. It developed, however, that she was a misfit in the home. She was a forced child, being unable to learn in school. He congratulated the agent on the very efficient manner in which he had handled the case and was of opinion that if the society had done nothing else they had amply justified their existence.

Miss McPhail, of the Health Centre, child welfare department and by permission of the chairman, addressed the meeting. She outlined the work the centre was trying to do and pointed out some of the difficulties they had to face.

She pleaded for closer co-operation between the department she represented and the children's aid society.

In thanking her for her remarks the chairman assured her that at all times the agent of the society would be ready and willing to do all in his power to help them in any way.

It was reported that 35 children are now in the home. None were taken in and none discharged during the month. One girl has been in the General Public Hospital for two weeks, having an operation performed on her nose.

MEET IN HILLSBORO

There are three women missionaries now on furlough, Miss Lockhart, of Falmouth, N.S., who is stationed at Yuyuru in India; Miss Myers, of Halifax, who is stationed at Marapatnam in India; and Miss Baker, of Dartmouth, N.S., who is stationed at Vizianagaram in India.

In addition it is expected that Rev. Dr. and Mrs. W. G. of Moncton, who are also home from the mission fields will give addresses at the convention.
