VALENTINO DENIES IT IS A MONEY QUARREL

Movie Actor Indicates Dissatisfaction With the Art Side of the Industry.

New York, Sept. 7.—Rudolph Valentino, moving picture actor, denied that the matter of money entered into his difficulties with the Famous Players-Lasky Corporation.

The law firm of Guggenheim, Untermyer & Marshall was retained by the Famous Players-Lasky Corporation, and in a letter to Will H. Hayes, overlord of the movies, announced that they would bring suit against Valentino to restrain him from violating his agreement to perform exclusively in motion pictures for the Famous Players-Lasky Corporation for a period which has about two and a half years to run.

"Pending the hearing of the application, which we are preparing for an injunction pendente lite," the letter ran, "it is important that no producer shall enter into a contract with Valentino in ignorance of the rights and claims of our client."

Mr. Graham was asked whether Valentino was receiving, as reported, a salary of approximately \$3,000 a week for his services.

"He's not getting anything like that \$3,000 divided by three would be more like it," he replied.

"I have been dissatisfied with the photography, management and direction—the handling of all my films," Valentino said. "They do not live up to my artistic ambitions."

"I am not interested in their box office value, but only from the artistic viewpoint. Some of the pictures I have made have been great money makers. 'The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse' earned more than \$2,000,000; 'The Sheik' earned more than \$1,000,000. That picture, incidentally, is my idea of a poor performance. I hate it."

Decisions in Boxing Bout. The boxing exhibition in the St. Andrew's rink last evening was attended by approximately 700 fans, who witnessed four bouts, two main bouts of ten rounds each and two preliminary affairs of six rounds. None of the bouts went the limit, although the fans witnessed some snappy exhibitions. In the main bout between Kid Paris and Claude Phinney the latter's seconds were compelled to throw the towel into the ring at the end of the sixth round on account of Phinney's right eye being badly split. His optic was bleeding and was also badly swollen that he could scarcely see out of it at all. Up to this time both boxers had earned two rounds and two were even.

The other main bout between Battling Christensen and Tommy Williams ended in the fourth round when Williams was awarded the decision on



LIQUOR AND DRUGS SEIZED IN RAID

Ten Persons Arrested as Result of Visit to a Hotel in Theatre District of New York.

New York, Sept. 8.—A raiding party of twenty-eight internal revenue agents, twelve police detectives and two assistant federal attorneys swept down on the Hotel Longacre, in the theatrical district last night, arrested ten persons and seized quantities of narcotics and liquor.

Assistant District Attorney Connolly, who carried a search warrant, said the raid was made as a step in a campaign to put a check to the widespread traffic in drugs in the white light district. While the raid was still in progress Mr. Connolly emerged from the hotel to announce:

"We are finding hypodermic needles, stoves for cooking narcotic drugs and all sorts of paraphernalia all through this place, and we are not through yet." The raid lasted an hour.


