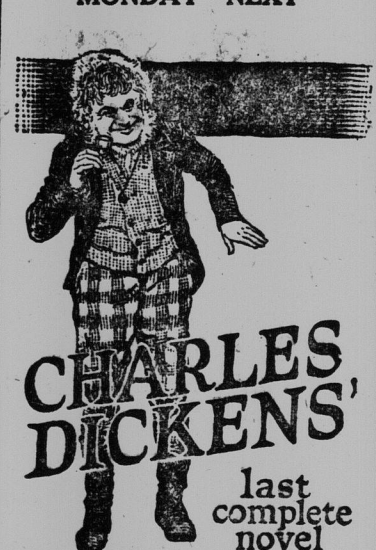

BOY SHOT IN THE BACK

Milton Youth Got Charge Aimed at Rabbit.

Milton, Ont., Jan. 19.—A regrettable shooting accident took place in John West's bush, at Indian Point, near Burlington, as a result of which Stanley Buckle, a 17-year-old Milton boy, may lose his life. He was shot through the back of his right side by James Trevellick of Burlington, who was aiming at a rabbit. The unfortunate lad was rushed to St. Joseph's Hospital, Hamilton,

where the bullet was extracted by Dr. Mowbray.

Buckle's brother, Jack and William Wilbert, the other two members of the hunting party, saw the shooting and state it was an accident. Full particulars of the affair were telephoned to Crown Attorney Dick here who took no action, as it was quite evident that the shooting was an accident. He, however, notified the lad's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Buckle of John street, who were at once rushed to the bedside of their son, who is still in a precarious condition, and not yet out of danger, as the wound is in a vital part of the body.
