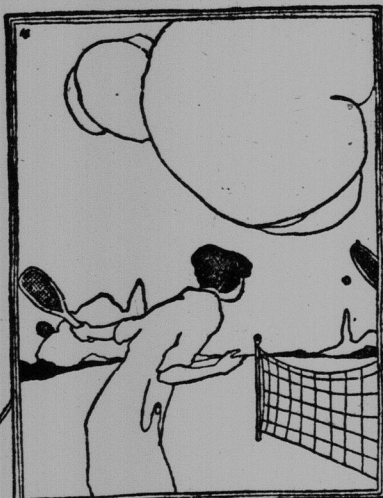
A REMEDY FOR THE

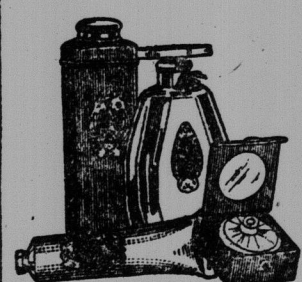

### RECENT DEATHS

Major General Sir David Mercer, K. C. B., has died on his fifty-sixth birthday, in London (Eng.), from heart failure, after a long illness. He had been since 1916 adjutant general of the Royal Marine Forces. He was born in London in July, 1864, and was the son of the late D. D. Mercer. He was a staff officer, deputy assistant adjutant general, assistant adjutant general, and brigadier general, commanding the First Royal Naval Brigade. In Gallipoli and elsewhere he was mentioned in despatches. He was made a Companion of the Bath, and later a Knight Commander of the Bath.

Moncton, N.B., July 26.—The death of James Bingham, one of Moncton's oldest and most respected residents, occurred about noon today. He had been in failing health for the last year. He was seventy-five years of age and had been a resident of Moncton for sixteen years when he came with his family to this city from county Tyrone, Ireland. Mr. Bingham leaves his wife also a native of Ireland, four sons and three daughters. The sons are William of Moncton; Livingston, Saint John; and Abraham, all living at home. The daughters are Mrs. W. E. Elliott, North Sydney; City Dicks and Elizabeth at home. The late Mr. Bingham was an active member of central Methodist church.

### SOME SNAPSHOTS ON THE EFFECT OF PROHIBITION

"Thank God for prohibition! It has given me a new lease of life. Look at it for yourself, and you'll see it's going to high school. Say, if you'd told me this a year ago, I'd have said it was a dream!"

Was Mrs. D's answer to the inquiries of a visitor of the Boston Provident Association who had known and helped her off and on for years. The reply is characteristic of many.  
"Eight children I've had, but no baby carriage have I ever pushed till this one came. It was my back that carried me. But look at the carriage Jack got me with the money that didn't go over the bar. My, but this is the life. I vote for prohibition! Well, I guess," said Mrs. Jack to one of the nurses of the District Nursing Association, who is a professional and the courts all discussion of the legal questions involved in the passage of the eighteenth amendment, but they, nevertheless, have some very definite and well-founded opinions regarding the social and economic burdens imposed by intemperance, and the lightening of those burdens resulting from prohibition. It is for this reason, therefore, that they consider it important to assemble the facts and give them such publicity as they deserve.

At the close of the year 1917 the Boston Provident Association was one of a total of 7,775 dependent families showed intemperance as a factor in their trouble. Eighteen per cent of all to whom \$27,000 had to be given in relief. In the 1,400 families in intemperance 9,925 children were growing up under conditions of neglect and abuse to which the term home is not applicable. Note the difference under prohibition; only eight such cases out of 465 family applications since July 1, 1919. The figures of the Associated Charities of Boston show a drop since 1917 from 27 per cent to 2 per cent in the last six months.

Since July 1, 1919, a collection of far pleasanter facts has been steadily going on in our files of folk who, at the saying goes, have not "seen better days." Out of twenty-five, for instance, fifteen in which the effects of alcohol had been most marked, and which the visitors have recently made a special effort to see, all but four can be offered as such examples of re-birth as no friend of theirs would have dared to hope for nine months ago. In every one of the twenty-two families there is a record of persisting sobriety according to landlords, teachers, friendly visitors and the families themselves. Of course, taking away a drunkard's liquor does not make a saint of him. But man after man in this group is now found sober, working steadily, supporting his home, his wife and good intentions reinforced by law. One wife comments: "He's the same Bill; believe me, he'd get it if he could," and admits that her only fear at present is lest there should be some relaxation in the law.

Miss Beard of the District Nursing Association, whose 106 nurses are making 1,000 visits daily, declares, "With all allowances for better employment and larger earnings, the nurse in every district of the city are finding great improvement in home conditions, undoubtedly due to prohibition. There are a few exceptions, but these are greatly outnumbered by those where improved home conditions exist, and most of all happy wives and children."

The agents of the Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children from all over the state are of the opinion that child-neglect cases arising from drunkenness are cut down to a third, possibly a fifth of those found last year, and many families whose children have been removed by court order have so improved their habits that their children are being returned to them. State Commissioner of Probation Herbert C. Parsons shows that arrests for drunkenness in the state for January and February, 1920, have been 2,134 compared with 18,579 in the same months, 1919. Other court offences have also notably decreased in number, such

were served under the convenship of Mrs. A. B. Mackenney. After a sing song, in which all took part, the party returned to the city shortly after 10 o'clock.

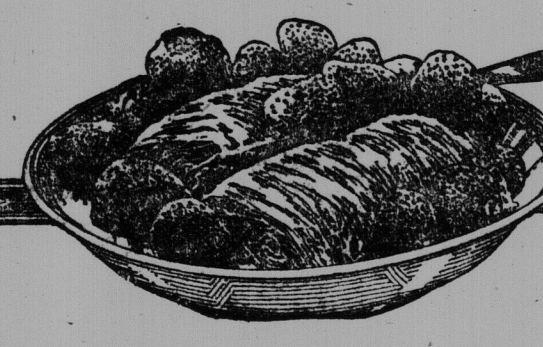
