HOLD-UP TRIED

IN MONTREAL

Three Men, Attack Citizen

Montreal, Dec. 23.—The hold-up crime
wave is beginning to affect Montreal,
and last night Peter Rabinovitch, of 222
Ontario street, who with his wife, had
just stepped into the courtyard of the
Berthole Apartments, where he lives,
when three men jumped on him and or-
dered him to hand over his money. He
gave light and called for help, as did
also his wife. Their cries attracted the
captain of a nearby fire station and a
chauffeur. When they arrived the hold-
up men jumped into an auto and sped
away. They gave chase and the men
stopped their car and ran away in dif-
ferent directions. Their machine was
found to be a car which had been stolen
earlier in the evening. No arrests were
made.

TO PARADE IN

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WAYAGAMACK

YEARLY REPORT

Montreal, Dec. 23.—The annual state-
ment of the Wayagamack Pulp and
Paper Co. Ltd., published today, to
November 30, shows earnings nearly
double those of the preceding year.
They stand at \$2,152,707 against \$1,203,
697 in 1919.

After fixed charges and taxes, etc.,
are deducted, there remains available for
dividend an amount equal to 22.1 per
cent and during the year the stock of
the company was put on a six per cent
basis.

Total assets have increased by nearly
\$3,000,000 and the most important other
changes in the balance sheet are an in-
crease of \$600,000 in accounts and bills
payable and a bank loss of \$600,000
these being the effect of purchases of
timber limits, etc., during the year.

DISCOUNTING OUR DOLLARS.

(Toronto Globe.)

New interest is taken in the exchange
situation between Canada and the United
States because of the record levels to
which the premium on New York funds
has climbed during the past few days.
Having now passed 18 per cent, and
with uncertainty, but a belief that it
will go yet higher, Canadians who have
financial relations with the United States
are naturally concerned as to the con-
ditions and its causes. Exchange at the
best is a subject for highly trained
bankers and economists, and even there
it is a rash man who ventures a prophe-
cy as to the course of exchange or to
give a full explanation of movements.

A good many Canadians who have not
studied the subject have nothing but in-
dignation for the American merchant
who would discount the Canadian dollar
by 15 or 20 per cent, and regard the
action as an insult. This, of course, is
not the explanation, for while an iso-
lated border merchant might for reasons
of dislike or natural spite take such ac-
tion, the fact that Canadian money is at
a substantial discount among the keen-
est traders and financiers on both
sides, shows that the discount is based
on fundamental conditions. The argu-
ment of insult or spite would not ex-
plain Canada's discount on the English
pound, which has persisted for months
past, and even now some improvement
the pound sterling is worth only
a little over \$4 in Canada.

Perhaps chief of the reasons for Cana-
dian money being at a discount across
the border is the large adverse balance
of trade between the two countries. Can-
ada's imports from the United States are
much larger than its exports to that
country. In pre-war days when such
a condition existed Canadian money was
maintained practically at par through
the free movement of gold, for the ex-
cess in imports was then met by the
shipment of gold from Canada to the
United States, or by payment from Great
Britain to the United States in gold or
otherwise for the excess of Canada's ex-
ports to Britain over Canada's imports
from Britain. Now, with both Canada
and Britain maintaining an embargo
against gold shipments, this automatic
adjustment does not take place. Canada
in other words continues heavy exports
to Europe and until recently had for two
or three years a favorable balance of
trade, but much of the exports to Europe
have been sold on credit, while imports
from the United States were paid for in
cash or securities. This renders Cana-
da's position in the States as one of
diminished strength.
