QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS IN THE LEGISLATURE

Hon. Mr. Foster in reply to Mr. Smith (Albert):
1.—Who are the employees of the workmen's compensation board, and their respective salaries?
Ans.—The employees of the workmen's compensation board, and their respective salaries are as follows:
John A. Sinclair, chairman, \$4,000
James C. Robinson, vice-chairman, 3,000
James L. Suggs, commissioner, 3,000
H. Russell Sturges, chief accountant, 2,500
Douglas R. Brown, claims officer, 1,500
Robert B. Irving, bookkeeper, 800
Alphonse T. LeBlanc, inspector, 1,200
J. F. L. Brown, M. D., advisory medical officer, 500
Miss Hilda B. Williams, secretary, 750
Miss Genevieve M. Killen, claims stenographer, 750
Miss Florence T. Nugent, stenographer, 520
Miss Mary K. Lannan, stenographer, 520
2.—On whose recommendation was each appointed?
Ans.—The commissioners constituting the board were appointed by the lieutenant-governor-in-council. The employees under the commissioners are appointed by the board, and there were no recommendations in these cases other than the board satisfying themselves that the staff was fit and competent to discharge their duties.
The Roads.
Hon. Mr. Veniot in reply to Mr. Smith (Caledonia), said:
1. Q.—What amount has been expended on ordinary roads during the last fiscal year?
Ans.—The amount expended on ordinary roads during the last fiscal year was \$184,022.29 including \$24,842.13 accounts payable, taken up in balance sheet or province at October 31, 1917.
2. Q.—What has been charged under this head since the close of the fiscal year?
Ans.—The amount expended on ordinary roads from November 1, 1918, to March 1, 1919, was \$25,239.77 including \$12,105.29 accounts payable taken up in balance sheet of Province at October 31, 1918.
3. Q.—What is the estimated length of said road?
Ans.—600 feet.
4. Q.—What amount was paid per cubic yard for stone for such road?
Ans.—Stone was furnished without charge by Messrs. Allison, Fleming, Gibson, Maynes, and others.
5. Q.—What amount was paid per cubic yard for hauling such stone?
Ans.—From fifty cents to \$1.30 according to distance hauled.
6. Q.—What amount was paid per day per team for hauling such stone?
Ans.—Paid according to amount hauled.
7. Q.—To what width is such road being widened?
Ans.—Sixteen feet on top.

Stockholm, March 15.—Lettish troops captured Fraunberg, northeast of Libau, from the Bolsheviki on Monday and took a great quantity of war material, a large number of machine guns and many prisoners, a despatch from Libau said. The Bolsheviki retired in the direction of Mitau.

ITALIAN MINISTER IN DIPLOMATIC TANGLE. Paris, March 17.—Reuter's correspondent learns that the new Italian minister to Serbia has left Belgrade because of the refusal of the government to recognize his credentials, which were addressed to the King of Serbia instead of to Serbia, Croatia and Slovenia combined. The United States alone thus far has recognized the tri-state as an entity. Stephen Michon, French foreign minister, said yesterday that its status had not yet been discussed by the supreme council.

The hook and ladder and hose cart were taken from the engine room but the blaze was put out before the apparatus reached the scene. It is said the fire originated near a chimney on the roof.
