wholly of New Brunswick men, he said that they had never once failed during the stress of battle and had made a record of which the province could well feel proud.

Colonel Davies also said that he could not let the occasion go by, as he considered it a duty to say a word in favor of the men who as drafts had come to the battalion and had been placed in military service under the M.
