

ALLIES PUT BAN ON THE HAPSBURGS

Tell Archduke Joseph Plainly Why He Cannot Rule

His House Largely Responsible for Calamities Under Which the World Now is Suffering—Ready to Deal with Government Representing All Parties

Paris, Aug. 23.—(By the Associated Press.) The supreme council tonight sent the following note to the Hungarian government, in which announcement it was made that the council would have no dealings with a government headed by Archduke Joseph or any other member of the Hapsburg family.

"The Allied and associated powers have been further considering information derived from our reports, and from other sources as to recent events in Budapest. Their conclusions are as follows:

"They are most anxious to conclude a durable peace with the Hungarian people, but they feel that this cannot be done while the present Hungarian government is in power. That government came into existence not by the will of the people but by a coup d'état carried out by a small body of police, under the protection of a foreign army.

"It has at its head a member of the house of Hapsburg whose policies and actions were largely responsible for the calamities under which the world is suffering, and will long suffer. A peace negotiated by such a government is not likely to be lasting, nor can the Allied and associated governments give the economic support which Hungary needs.

"In its reply that Archduke Joseph is prepared, before approaching the Allied and associated governments, to submit his claims to the test of popular elections we must reply that this procedure cannot be satisfactory if the election is to be carried out under the auspices of an administration, which the archduke himself controls.

"The difficulties in the way of obtaining by election of a faithful reflection of the popular will are, in the present unhappy state of Hungary, most serious. They would be overwhelming if an election were carried out under Hapsburg influences. Even if an assembly elected under such circumstances were really representative no one would think so.

"In the interest, therefore, of European peace the Allied and associated governments mean to insist that the present claimant to the leadership of the Hungarian state should resign and that a government in which all parties are represented should appeal to the Hungarian people.

"The Allied and associated powers would be prepared to negotiate with any government which possessed the confidence of an assembly so elected. The note was signed by Premier Clemenceau.

Paris, Aug. 25.—Telegrams received by the supreme council show that Archduke Joseph was still in power in Hungary on Saturday, but it is indicated that his resignation is expected soon.

Paris, Aug. 25.—Rumanian forces were still requisitioning goods at Budapest on Saturday and paying no attention to the warning from the supreme council, according to advices reaching the council this morning.

LATER. Paris, Aug. 25.—The resignation of the Hungarian government of Archduke Joseph, previously reported in press advices, was announced in press advices received by the supreme council today. The messages indicated that the resignation occurred at 8 o'clock on Saturday night and that the process of forming a new cabinet had been begun.

In the new cabinet, the despatches state, Paul Garami, minister of justice in the Peidl cabinet, would be minister of commerce, while former Premier Peidl would be minister of food. Karl Payer, minister of home affairs in the Peidl government, is designated as minister of labor in the reconstructed ministry and Count Grany as minister of foreign affairs. The other places in the cabinet have not been filled.

THE GOLIATH HAD PROPELLER TROUBLE

Paris, Aug. 25.—Further details were received yesterday by the ministry of the colonies concerning the long-missing airplane Goliath which was found on Saturday. During the flight from Mogador, Morocco, toward Dakar, French West Africa, the machine developed propeller trouble and was forced to land near the village of Koufre, in the Mauritania region, 180 miles north of St. Louis. The propeller previously had been the cause of trouble on the flight from Casablanca to Mogador, where it was repaired.

The district in the vicinity of Koufre is thinly populated, and it is not known as yet by whom the Goliath was found. It is believed, however, that one of the flying columns sent out to search for the missing craft discovered its whereabouts. The eight persons aboard the airplane are safe.

WALKS TO MCGILL AND TELLS DOCTORS SHE DRANK CARBOLIC

Montreal, Aug. 25.—Walking from a cab to the Homeopathic Hospital in McGill College avenue, early this morning a woman, who gave her name as Gertrude Slavrow, twenty-five years of age, told the doctors that she had taken carbolic acid and wanted to die. Medical attention was immediately given her, but she died five minutes after her arrival at the hospital.

The woman's body was sent to the morgue, and Walter Hoffman, who was mentioned by the woman, was sent to detective headquarters to be held as a witness in the case.

FINE RECEPTION FOR GREEK WHO MADE GOOD IN WAR

Lynn, Mass., Aug. 25.—Sergeant Hercules Korgis of Co. L, 23d Infantry, was tendered a reception by the city officials and prominent men of the city here. Sergeant Korgis captured single-handed 256 Germans at Soissons. He has been at Camp Devens for the last week, pending his being naturalized.

He was given the place of honor in a parade of 700 Greeks, who marched from the Greek Orthodox church in South Common street to the city hall, where they were met by Mayor Creamer. The mayor paid a tribute to Korgis and gave him the key to the city. He was then taken to the mayor's office, and was met by about 100 citizens, including many G. A. R. men.

Korgis was later escorted to the state armory, where about 2500 people were assembled. Addresses were made by Mayor Creamer, City Councilors Joyce, Mitchell, Fitzgerald and Cochran, Senator George H. Jackson, who represented Governor Coolidge, Representative George H. Newhall and Henry P. Dunn of West Lynn.

A fund is being raised among the citizens to start Korgis in the restaurant business. He will make his home at West Lynn.
