In order to meet the demand of labor for an eight-hour day, the Canadian Railway War Board has directed that, effective October 15, 1913, all railway freight sheds shall be opened for the re-ceipt and delivery of freight on week days at 7.30 a. m. daily and closed at 5.00 p. m. daily, except on Saturday, on which day the sheds shall be closed at 1 p. m.


