Some Hope For Boxing.

New York, Jan. 6.—Although several local boxing promoters have come into conflict with the authorities by running glove combats under the membership plan, other cities in the state seem to be having less trouble than was expected. On New Year's Day, Jack Britton, the former welterweight champion, and Jimmy Duffy, Buffalo idol, fought ten rounds in that city before a large crowd. This was the most important bout attempted since the Frawley law went out. It attracted a great deal of attention in Buffalo and surrounding towns, but the advertising it received did not bring down the police on the promoters. In this city the Pioneer Sporting Club has been running without interference, although nothing in the nature of a first class bout has been staged. However, if a favorable decision is handed down in the cases now pending before the courts, local fans will have an opportunity to see something worth while again.

**Belgian Dies of Torture.**  
Washington, Jan. 8.—The death by mental torture and privation of Rene Paillet, a distinguished Brussels lawyer, in a German prison camp, who had been accused of collaborating with "Libre Belgique," the famous patriotic but clandestine publication in Belgium, is reported to the Belgian legation. The following despatch also said: "In spite of long and careful search, and of promises of large rewards to informants, Germany has not been able to put her hands on the publishers of the brave little clandestine paper Libre Belgique," the intermediary of which the inhabitants of invaded Belgium received news which the German authorities have never seen."
