"And German Sea Power Dares Assert Itself Only in Submarine Assassination"

"Real Democracy," But W. G. Smith Sounds Warning Note Against "Socialized Paternalistic System"

"The relations between Canadian and American lawyers have always been cordial," said Walter George Smith, of Philadelphia, president of the American Bar Association, to the Ontario Bar Association. His subject was "Democracy under constitutional limitations."

"But such relations have become inimic of recent years," he said. "Our traditions are much alike; we have inherited from our common mother, England, a venerable system of law, and we share the great responsibility unimpaired in any of its guarantees. While it is true that the American Republic is made up of many diverse elements, its language, its literature, the fundamental principles upon which its political and social systems are based, are the same as yours."

"The problems which are testing our statesmanship, while greater in degree, are not different in kind from those with which your young and vigorous nation grapples so bravely and so successfully. While we are a separate nationality, the logic of events has brought us into close and sympathetic relations with the British Empire. Our democracy is fighting a common battle with yours for the preservation of Christian civilization. Our political leaders are at one with yours

When Peace Comes.

When peace comes, we shall look upon a changed world. Reverence for the past will have lost its force with the multitude; respect for authority has already been undermined by the continued appeals of half-educated demagogues.

The danger most to be feared is that, in seeking reformation for acknowledged defects in democratic institutions, our English-speaking people may fall into the heresies which made the French revolution the preparation for despotism.

and in our day has brought the Russian people to the brink of anarchy.

Under the awful stress of this unprecedented war, the duty of the patriotic citizen is clear: With a full persuasion of the value of the checks and balances necessary for the preservation of free government, every effort must be directed toward winning the war. Failure to do so will leave us at the mercy of a ruthless power, which looks upon might as the only test of right—a power which invokes the Deity, not as incarnated in the crucified Saviour, but in the war gods of the Vikings.

When the war is won, what are we to say to the vast mass of jealousy and discontent which has been bred in the very heart of our social system? We must recognize the fact that democ-

racy's direct foes are in her own household. We must educate the masses into an appreciation of the necessity of self-control and self-renunciation.

Quotes Toronto Judge.

Mr. Smith quoted Mr. Justice Riddell's book on the Constitution of Canada, and added: "The result is that the people of the United States of America are governed in part, indeed, by the legislators elected by themselves, but in no small measure by the hand and the voice of the dead. After all, in the vexed questions of political government, the tree must be judged by its fruit."

"For more than a generation, the careless, wasteful administration in America has been contrasted with German efficiency, until the more our entire policy came to the ideal of perfection. Since August, 1914, we have been undergoing a process of disillusionment. The German sea power dares to assert itself only in the submarine method of assassination. It needs but a little time to prove that, after all, the ideal of the German naval and military efficiency has feet of clay."

"While the emergency of a great war has made it necessary to put well-nigh dictatorial power in the hands of the executive branch of the government, it must be limited strictly to abnormal conditions, or we shall pass insensibly into a socialized paternalistic system, the very antithesis of real democracy."
