**MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRE**

The Peel Lumber Company, Limited, with head office at Moncton, N.B., has signed to James Fowles, of East York, Ontario.

The Royal Gazette contains the announcement of the removal from office of James Friel, as registrar of probates and clerk of the peace for Westmorland county, and of Allan W. Chapman, as clerk of the circuit court for the same county. The vacancies are filled by the appointment of Robert W. Hawson, K.C., and Arthur N. Charters.

A shortage of about 15,000,000 feet in the lumber cut on the crown lands of the province as compared with last year's figures, is estimated by W. H. Berry, superintendent of forests.

Five in the tailoring establishment of H. L. Wray, at St. John's, yesterday, did damage amounting to about \$1,000, mostly covered by insurance.

Immense quantities of Maine potatoes are being shipped to Boston over the C. P. R. at present at from \$1.20 to \$1.35 a barrel. The D. & A. is interfering with the work considerably.

The natural gas supply of Moncton was all last evening. There was some water in the pipes and it froze, and this caused the shutting off of the gas supply upon which so many residences are entirely dependent for light and heat. Business houses as well as private dwellings suffered, and the town was in darkness.

A complimentary banquet was last night tendered to Hon. R. L. Borden in Ottawa by Sir Edmund Clive. Various nice things were served of the premier. During the evening a cabinet of silver was presented to C. A. Munson on the occasion of his recent marriage. Mr. Borden made the presentation.

Plans for a large portion of the land required by the government for the new Halifax terminal were filed there this morning. The property extends for a mile along the southern waterfront to Point Pleasant Park, and thence westward to Young Avenue. B. A. Western, of the Eastern Trust Company, has been appointed chairman of a board to decide on the price, and owners who cannot agree will settle the matter in the Exchequer court.

The Austro-American Company has decided to inaugurate a monthly service between Trieste, Patras, and other Mediterranean ports to Canada, beginning next month. The Hamburg American and North German Lloyd lines are both interested in the Austro-American Company. This will be a C. P. R. competitor.

**MORNING LOCALS**

Bubble fountains were installed in the west side ferry waiting rooms yesterday and patrons can now quench their thirst without the aid of germ-laden cups. Similar fountains will be placed in the west side ferry house.

A. E. March and Engineer Trainor of the steamer Brun, and Captain Spradlin of Halifax, will sail on the S. S. Corsican this week for Liverpool to bring to this country the new Reid ice-breaker Lintore. The new steamer is to be put on the North Sydney-Port Beague route.

At a meeting of the stationery engineers last night, a report was received stating that the engineers of Amherst had organized under the banner of the association.

Margaret Brennan of Fairville was injured while coasting in Fairville yesterday. She ran into a picket fence and received minor injuries.

The wedding of George Harold Markham of Sussex and Miss Lili Boardly of Moncton, England, took place in the Zion Methodist church here yesterday. Rev. Wm. Lawson performed the ceremony.

The chemical engine was called out yesterday morning for a slight fire in the kitchen of the Monastery of the Good Shepherd in Waterloo street. The fire ignited from a spark from a stove.

The secretary-treasurer of the Alberta Town Planning and Housing Association has written to W. F. Burditt, announcing that a bill, modeled on New Brunswick's town-planning act will be introduced in the next session of the legislature, and asking how the act has worked out in the province. Although adopted last year the provisions of the act have not yet been put in effect.

## ROOSEVELT STILL FULL OF FIGHT

Tells 2,000 Admirers at New York Dinner That the "Progressive Party Has Come to Stay"

New York, Feb. 12.—Former President Roosevelt made his first public appearance in the councils of the Progressive party for many weeks tonight to say that, so far as he was concerned, there would be no compromise, no amalgamation, no yielding in the fight for the party. "The Progressive party has come to stay," he declared.

Many of the conspicuous figures in the Progressive campaign last fall gathered for the Lincoln day dinner of the National Progressive party. The 2,000 seats at the table were all taken, many of them by women, and hundreds of spectators filled the balcony overlooking the hall room in which the dinner was held.

Reveridge, Progressive candidate for governor of Indiana at the last election; Oscar S. Straus, who ran for governor in New York; Miss Mary Antin, a New York settlement worker; William H. Hochstetler, former Progressive state chairman; Bainbridge Colby, of New York; and ex-Congressman W. Bourke Cockran, also made speeches.

Some of the guests at the dinner were Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, Miss Anne Morgan, daughter of J. P. Morgan; Frank Munsey, Richard Harding Davis, William Prudden, comptroller of New York city; William Leach, Jr., collector of the port of New York; T. Douglas Robinson, Progressive state chairman; J. Sergeant Frank, public service commissioner; Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel Corporation; and William F. McCoombe, chairman of the Democratic National committee.

A party of 200 persons was present from the New England States and there were delegations from a dozen other states.

## THE KAISER AS A FARMER

Berlin, Feb. 12.—Emperor William gave a most interesting account of his experiences as a farmer in an informal speech delivered today before the German Agricultural Council. He went into details in regard to the improvements he had made on his estate at Kadinen. Since 1907 he had increased the arable land there from 500 to 632 acres, besides reclaiming 306 acres of meadow land which previously had produced practically nothing. It gave 225 tons of hay besides pasturing seventy

eighty head of cattle in 1910. In 1911 it yielded 450 tons of hay and pastured 120 cattle and ninety horses.

The emperor further explained that he hoped to develop a faster breed of oxen "which will get home the harvest wagon in quicker time than the kinds now used. I have doubt, however, whether I shall be able successfully to challenge the imperial stud farm at Trakhenen to a race with zebras calves."

The emperor concluded: "After my experience it is beyond all doubt that the German farmers are able to supply Ger-

many's entire food, more particularly bread, meats and potatoes not only now but when we have an increased population in the future."
