Dr. McEwen addressed the convention on the problem of teacher training, telling of the methods adopted by the International Association for the encouragement of this work. In the conference which followed, delegates made suggestions with regard to the formation of classes and the best course of study.

Andrew Malcolm acted as chairman and the opening devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. George Steele, of Shediac. During the evening a pleasing doer was given by Rev. J. P. Williams, of Margville, and his brother, Stanley A. Williams, of St. John.

The offering during the evening amounted to \$80.92, which with \$41 pledged and \$72.25 contributed in the afternoon, made the day's total \$194.97. The report of the credentials committee showed that those who registered numbered 236.

Rev. S. J. McArthur, in his closing address to the child and the evangel, emphasized the necessity for truth and accuracy in teaching the young minds, and in the most of the great importance of home training.

Rev. G. A. Lawson gave an able address on the work of the Sunday association, and the manner in which it had spread good among the members and the children in the schools of St. Francis.

Rev. D. Lang was heard in an interesting description of the International S. S. Convention in San Francisco. A vote of thanks was then tendered the recording secretary, Mrs. M. J. Steeves, for her work in keeping the minutes of the convention and the minutes were adopted as read.

The closing moments of the session were devoted to a consecration service led by Rev. C. R. Flanders, D. D., who, in an eloquent address pleaded for greater devotion and greater self-consecration on the part of the workers.

The convention closed with the singing of the old hymn, "God be With You Till We Meet Again."

TO SAVE BRUSSELS LACE INDUSTRY Belgian Queen Organizes Co-operative Society to Prevent Its Extinction

Brussels, Oct. 20.—Under the patronage of Queen Elizabeth a committee has been formed in Brussels to save the Brussels lace industry from extinction. For many years, although Brussels lace has been as much and possibly more in demand than ever, the local workmen have well nigh abandoned this industry, which has the inconvenience of yielding too small a profit, of needing a very lengthy apprenticeship, and of destroying the eyesight of those engaged in that kind of work. The picturesque old "dentelliers" type has almost disappeared from Belgium, and the newcomers now all work in factories so that the making of the genuine Brussels lace is attended with greater difficulties every day.

Queen Elizabeth has long since been interested in this question, and is working actively to revive the decaying industry. At her initiative, co-operative society has now been formed, called "La Dentelle Belge." The board includes several professors of the Brussels University, as well as Her Majesty's secretary, M. Ingelbick.

The company has a capital of \$27,000, which will be spent in the study of the labor market and the commercial market of lace in the amelioration of the lot of the lace-makers in the introduction of lace-making courses in professional schools, and finally in the search of foreign markets for the sale of Belgian lace. The capital has been subscribed by some of the wealthiest people in Belgium.
