Tricks Tried on Ball Field Toronto, May 7.—President Edward G. MAKE OPERA FROM THE LAST DAYS OF POMPEII

Vienna, May 8.—Two Viennese librettists, M. Schroeder and Prosser, and a young Italian composer, Signor Marziano Perosi, have made an opera out of Bulwer Lytton's "Last Days of Pompeii," and this old friend of one's youth has just made its appearance on the stage in the Volkoper in Vienna. The story is, of course, very much simplified, and the dramatic personae are cut down practically to five. A Pompeian winthrop, the temple of Jea, the city gardens, and the vaults of the amphitheatre make effective pictures, but neither the resources of the theatre nor the inspiration of the composer were quite adequate to represent the final catastrophe of the eruption in a convincing manner. The music of Perosi, who must not be confounded with his brother, the priest-composer of oratorios and the conductor in the Sistine Chapel at the Vatican, is attractive, some times melodious, but not very dramatic. The public was very enthusiastic, and the arch-priest made a great success, to which the charming appearance and singing of Mlle. Jerrits as Lylia largely contributed.

As a result of the recent storm in Oklahoma a tornado drill has been inaugurated at the Enterprise School near Wata, by the principal, Miss Hattie Moon. The pupils are lined up on signal, and they run to the nearest cyclone cellar, which is a quarter of a mile away.
