Ex-President's Widow Sips from a Cup as Firemen Work in Son's Coffee House-Prize Paintings in

New York, April 10.-Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt Sr., widow of Colonel Roosevelt, was among the patrons of the Double R Coffee House, operated by her sons and relatives, one day last week, when firemen, with hose, chemextinguishers, axes and hooks Mrs. Roosevelt showed no alarm when the fire started in the rear of the cof-fee house and smoke filled the estab-

lishment.

The widow of the former President calmly sipped her coffee while Frank Sardis, manager, doffed his coat, ran back into the kitchen and directed the bucket brigade. Sardis and his men kept the fire under control until the fire apparatus arrived in response to an alarm turned in by a policeman. As the smoke began to fill the coffee house Sardis and his employes hurriedly draped two large oil paintings of Colonel Roosevelt hanging on opposite walls in the front of the establishment. 
