The Orange celebration on the 12th at Montreal was a grand success; over 1000 Orangemen being in the parade. The Fredericton Orangemen have reason to feel proud of the appearance they made in the procession, it being freely admitted that their marching and general appearance was fully as good if not better than the others. After a good, long and hot march the parade broke up at Orange Park, where Grand Master Fowler addressed the people. Among his remarks he stated that the Orange order was a three-fold one, religious, benevolent and political. He also said Orangemen were charged with being sowers of sedition and discord by insisting upon commemorating the Battle of the Boyes. The latter was celebrated as on the issue of that battle depended. The decision meant that the dark cloud of slavery which had rolled across the horizon were drawn back and then there shone forth the dawn of a civil and religious liberty for Europe. After a few other remarks Mr. Fowler ended his speech by congratulating the Orangemen on their great success in arranging such a grand celebration.
