A Continuation of the Evidence Taken in the Forenoon.

The "u" in "Thos," "Deinstad," and in "de Soyres," is found in "dysalid," also in the word "send" and in "seng." This is seen more particularly in paper No. 11, in the word "Holly." The same "u" is found in Hyslop, and the "u" in "sola" corresponds to the "u" in "salpêtre."

The downward stroke of the "u" in "send" is almost identical with the downward stroke in "u" in "John."

(Papers Nos. 31, 32, and 33 shown.) The "u" in these are the same as the "u" in the address. There is less disguise in these letters in the directions on the boxes than in any of the other letters.

(Entry "R. D. McKelvey" shown.) The "u" in "Arthur" has the downward stroke without any loop like the downward stroke of the "u" in "John," and the "u" in "Arthur" is the same as the "u" in "Soyres" and "Macrae." There is no question in my mind about these "u"s being made by the same hand.

(Entry in book "J. McMillan & Co." shown.) The "u" in "chloride" is like those elsewhere.

(Memorandum book found on package shown.) The "u" in "shoemaker" and the "u" in "brother" are similar to those in "Macrae" and "Soyres."

They are not exactly alike, but the man in writing the addresses was trying to disguise his hand.

(Entry "C. K. Short" shown.) There again is the same "u" in "Hyslop" and in "Short."

(Entry "Ed. McCormack" shown.) The top of the "u" in "Ed" is something similar to the top of the "u" in "de Soyres."

(Entry "H. W. Barker" shown.) The "u" here is in the same manner as the "u" with a straight down stroke and a hook at the bottom.

(Entry "G. W. C. Allen" and "H. W. Barker" shown.) The dots of the "u"s are made peculiarly, very round, as in "City" on the packages. The writer of these entries and the writer of the addresses make their "u"s the same.

(Entry "G. W. H. Hosen" shown.) The "u" is made in the same manner as the "u" on the "Deinstad" box.

In the memorandum book the "u" in "Hyslop" is similar to the "u" referred to. I wish to call attention to the "u"s in the papers containing the "u"s. These "u"s are made by the same hand that made the "u" in "Hyslop" and the "u" in the de Soyres box. They are identical. They are not exactly alike because that would be impossible; but as two figures were made alike.
