Hostilities will not be permitted within the three-mile limit of Jamaica, and any Spanish ship so captured could claim the hospitality of Great Britain, delivery up and damages. If, however, the capture was re-sisted, no redress would lie, the resistance being a violation of sovereignty. Wessels of the United States and Spain in distress could call at the port of Jamaica and obtain coal and provisions and sufficient repairs to reach the nearest port of the na-tionality of the distressed vessel.
