

and the issuing of teachers' certifi-cates, but it is specifically enjoined on the board that the text books must be equal to those used in the public schools of the province, while teach-ers themselves are not to be inferior to those who have more divided the teachto those who have passed through the Provincial Normal Schools and are mployed in the public schools. In the event of the provincial auth-orities failing to appoint a Catholic board of education, such board will be appointed by the federal authori-


